## Why is the order being criticised?

- The residents around Jantar Mantar petitioned the NGT for freeing the roads of alleged nuisance in the area during protests.  $\n$
- NGT ordered a total ban on protests at Jantar Mantar to remedy it.  $\n$
- The order is being criticised for being vaguely worded & failing to scrutinise the claims of the petitioners.  $\n$

- Also, it is outside the tribunal's scope to have a determinative say in how public spaces are to be used for non-violent dissent.  $\n$
- NGT even suggested that Ramlila Maidan as an alternative venue for protests.

- This raises several concerns about the tribunal's attitude towards use of public spaces for protests.
