

Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy (CTE)

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Why in News?

Football Player, Shane Tamura who killed four people in New York claimed he was suffering from chronic traumatic encephalopathy.

• Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy (CTE) - It is a *progressive brain disorder* caused by repeated head injuries or concussions.

Concussions cause the brain to move rapidly within the skull, potentially stretching and damaging brain cells.

- The term "CTE" stands for:
 - **Chronic** Long-lasting and ongoing.
 - **Traumatic** Linked to injury to trauma.
 - **Encephalopathy** A disease of the brain.
- **Symptoms** Early symptoms like Depression, aggression, mood swings, and personality changes.
- As the disease progresses, people may experience confusion, memory loss, and difficulty with planning or decision-making.
- In advanced cases, movement problems can also develop.
- **Common Occurrence** CTE has been most commonly observed in athletes involved in sports such as football, boxing, and hockey, as well as military veterans exposed to blast injuries.
- Victims of domestic violence or others with a history of frequent head injuries.
- **Diagnosis** The disease can *only be definitively diagnosed after death, during autopsy.*
- **Treatment** Currently **no treatment** or cure for CTE.

Quick Facts

- **Commotio Celebri** Hippocrates described commotio celebri, 'commotion of the brain' as a vigorous shake or blow to the head that caused temporary loss of speech, hearing, and sight.
- **Punck Drunk Syndrome** Martland coined the term "Punch drunk" to describe this disease that afflicted pugilists.
- First identified in 1920's among boxers. It most often affects fighters of the who are usually poor boxers and who take considerable head punishment, seeking only to land a knockout blow.
