

India in WTO Fisheries Subsidies Agreement

Why in News?

Recently, India deposited its Instrument of Acceptance of the WTO Agreement on Fisheries Subsidies (AFS), becoming the 123rd WTO member to join.

- **Objective** - To promote conservation and sustainable use of marine resources, prevent overexploitation, and discipline harmful subsidies supporting large industrial fleets.

Key Features of the Agreement

- **Scope** - Applies to marine wild capture fishing and related activities at sea.
- **Exclusions** - Aquaculture and inland fisheries remain outside its ambit.
- **Prohibitions** - Prohibits support linked to Illegal, Unreported, and Unregulated (IUU) fishing and overfished stocks.
- **Sustainability objective** - Marks the first multilateral WTO agreement with an explicit environmental sustainability objective.

Significance for India

- **Small-Scale Fishers** - Safeguards livelihoods of traditional and small-scale fishing communities.
- **Seafood Exports** - Enhances India's credibility as a responsible seafood exporter, improving access to premium markets valuing sustainability and traceability.
- **Shrimp Exports** - India's aquaculture-based shrimp exports remain outside scope, ensuring resilience and competitiveness.
- **Global Equity** - Benefits countries like India that are not major industrial fishing nations, by disciplining distant-water fleets.
