

India Steps Up Efforts to Eliminate Hepatitis by 2030

Why in News?

Hepatitis

- Hepatitis refers to the ***inflammation of the liver*** caused primarily by viral infections, as well as toxic substances (such as alcohol and drugs) or autoimmune conditions.
- **Primary Viral Strains** - There are five main strains of the hepatitis virus: **A, B, C, D, and E.**
- **Major Threat Drivers** - **Hepatitis B and C** are the most common causes of severe, chronic liver conditions, leading directly to liver cirrhosis and primary liver cancer.
- **Key Policy/Programme** - National Viral Hepatitis Control Programme (NVHCP).
- India is systematically strengthening its public health response to eliminate viral hepatitis as a public health threat by 2030.
- This strategy aligns directly with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 3 (SDG 3.3).
- It aims to combat communicable diseases, including hepatitis, HIV, and malaria.

Key Implementation Pillars & Innovations

- **Free Screening & Treatment** - The government provides free screening, diagnostic testing, and antiviral medications for Hepatitis B and C nationwide.
- **Affordability via Generic Drugs** - Smart deployment of local health funds and affordable generic drugs has significantly reduced treatment costs, making large-scale public distribution feasible.
- **Decentralization to Primary Care** - Diagnostic and therapeutic services are actively moving from district hospitals down to local primary healthcare centres, bringing care closer to last-mile communities.

- **Inter-Programmatic Integration** - The initiative links hepatitis prevention with existing national health programmes (such as reproductive/child health and injection safety protocols) to maximize reach.
