

Indo-Pacific Partnership for Maritime Domain Awareness (IPMDA)

Why in News?

The Indo-Pacific Partnership for Maritime Domain Awareness (IPMDA) offers a practical framework for strengthening maritime security through information-sharing and technology.

What is the background?

- **Significance of Indo-Pacific** - The Indo-Pacific has emerged as the principal artery of global trade, connecting the energy-rich Persian Gulf with the manufacturing centres of East Asia and consumer markets across the world.
- Its maritime routes carry a substantial share of global commerce and pass through critical chokepoints such as the Strait of Malacca, the Strait of Hormuz and the Bab-el-Mandeb.
- **Conflicts in West Asia** - Recent conflicts in West Asia and growing geopolitical competition have demonstrated that disruptions in these waters can rapidly affect global supply chains, energy security and inflation.
- In this context, **Maritime Domain Awareness (MDA)** has become indispensable for ensuring freedom of navigation and unimpeded trade.
- For India and the United States, deeper cooperation under IPMDA can therefore serve both strategic and economic interests.

What is the IPMDA?

- **IPMDA** - The **Indo-Pacific Partnership for Maritime Domain Awareness**.
- **Launched by** - It is a technology and training initiative launched by the **Quad nations (Australia, India, Japan, and the United States)** at the May 2022 Tokyo Summit.
- It provides a real-time, integrated, and cost-effective overview of the maritime domain across the Indo-Pacific.

What are the key goals and functions of IPMDA?

- **Track Dark Shipping** - Focuses on ships that turn off their Automatic Identification System (AIS) transponders.
- **Combat Illegal Fishing** - Helps nations monitor illegal, unreported, and unregulated

(IUU) fishing.

- **Disaster Response** - Supports detection and response to climate events and humanitarian crises.
- **Data Fusion** - Uses commercial satellite radio frequency (RF) data and radar feeds instead of deploying new hardware.
- **Geographic Scope** - Connects the Pacific Islands, Southeast Asia, and the Indian Ocean Region.
- **Partner Hubs** - Works with regional information centers like the Information Fusion Centre - Indian Ocean Region (IFC-IOR) in Gurugram, India.
- **Complementary Frameworks** - Integrates with newer regional security efforts like the Indo-Pacific Maritime Surveillance Collaboration (IPMSC).

How Indo-Pacific acts as a global trade artery?

- **The Indo-Pacific as the Global Economic Lifeline** - The Indo-Pacific is not merely a geographical construct; it is the circulatory system of the global economy.
- **Strategic Maritime Trade Routes** - Major sea lanes connect the oil and gas producers of West Asia with the industrial economies of East Asia and the consumer markets of Europe and the Americas.
- **Strategic Maritime Chokepoints** - Several maritime chokepoints lie within or adjacent to this region.
- **The Strait of Malacca and Strait of Hormuz** - The Strait of Malacca is vital for trade between the Indian and Pacific Oceans, while the Strait of Hormuz is crucial for global energy supplies.
- **The Strategic Importance of Bab-el-Mandeb** - The Bab-el-Mandeb connects the Red Sea with the Gulf of Aden and is an important route between Europe and Asia.
- **Global Consequences of Maritime Disruptions** - Disruptions at these locations can have consequences far beyond the region.
- The West Asia crisis has illustrated how insecurity around maritime routes can increase shipping costs, delay deliveries and threaten energy supplies.
- **Maritime Security as an Economic Imperative** - Thus, maintaining open and secure sea lanes is not only a military objective but also an economic necessity.

What are the emerging maritime surveillance deficit?

- **The Indo-Pacific's Maritime Surveillance Deficit** - Despite its importance, the Indo-Pacific faces a significant maritime surveillance deficit.
- **Challenges to Continuous Maritime Domain Awareness** - The vastness of the oceans, jurisdictional limitations and inadequate surveillance capabilities of several coastal states make it difficult to maintain continuous awareness of maritime activity.
- **The Challenge of Dark Shipping and AIS Disruption** - One major challenge is the phenomenon of vessels "going dark" by switching off their Automatic Identification System (AIS) transponders.
- Such behaviour can facilitate sanctions evasion, concealment of cargo, illegal fishing and illicit ship-to-ship transfers.
- Smaller fishing vessels may also fall outside mandatory AIS requirements, making them difficult to track.

- **Grey-Zone Tactics and Emerging Maritime Threats** - The problem is not limited to conventional maritime crimes.
- State and non-state actors increasingly employ grey-zone tactics, including coercive and ambiguous activities that remain below the threshold of conventional military conflict.
- Such actions can threaten maritime infrastructure, commercial shipping and regional stability.
- Therefore, effective maritime security requires more than naval presence.
- It requires the ability to detect, identify and interpret activities across a vast maritime space.

How IPMDA serves as a technology-based solution?

- It seeks to improve the ability of Indo-Pacific partners to monitor maritime activity and share relevant information.
- Its importance lies in its emphasis on **information rather than militarisation**.
- By integrating data from commercial satellite-based systems, radio-frequency monitoring, radar networks and other sensors, IPMDA can generate a more comprehensive picture of maritime activity.
- Such near-real-time information can help countries identify suspicious vessels, monitor illegal fishing, respond to maritime emergencies and protect commercial shipping.
- It also strengthens transparency, which itself can act as a deterrent against coercive behaviour.
- The effectiveness of IPMDA ultimately depends on interoperability, timely information-sharing and the capacity of partner countries to translate data into effective action.

Why the India-U.S. Cooperation is crucial in IPMDA?

- **Shared Strategic Interests in the Indo-Pacific** - India and the United States have a natural convergence of interests in ensuring a free, open and secure Indo-Pacific.
- **The Need for Regional Maritime Cooperation** - For Washington, stronger cooperation with regional powers is essential because the United States cannot independently monitor the entire Indo-Pacific.
- **India's Maritime Security Imperatives** - For New Delhi, maritime security is directly connected with its economic interests, energy security and position as a leading Indian Ocean power.
- **IFC-IOR as an Institutional Foundation** - India's Information Fusion Centre-Indian Ocean Region (IFC-IOR), established in Gurugram in 2018, provides an important institutional foundation for such cooperation.
- **Information Sharing and IPMDA** - It facilitates information-sharing with partner countries and complements the broader objectives of IPMDA.
- **Role of Maritime-Domain-Awareness Technologies** - The acquisition and use of maritime-domain-awareness technologies, including U.S.-origin systems such as SeaVision, can further improve India's capacity to monitor maritime traffic and share information with partners.

What is the potential benefits of Expanding the IPMDA Network?

- The success of IPMDA depends upon its ability to include countries beyond the Quad.
- **ASEAN members, Pacific Island states and Indian Ocean littoral countries** possess valuable geographic positions and local knowledge.
- Smaller states such as **Bangladesh, the Maldives, Seychelles, Sri Lanka and Fiji** can particularly benefit from enhanced maritime surveillance.
- Although many possess their own monitoring capabilities, limited resources and jurisdictional constraints often prevent them from effectively addressing transnational maritime crimes.
- Greater information-sharing can enable these countries to identify suspicious vessels, combat illegal fishing and strengthen maritime law enforcement without compromising their sovereignty.
- The European Union can also become an important partner because of its economic dependence on secure maritime trade routes connecting Europe with Asia.
- Broader cooperation would transform IPMDA from a Quad initiative into a wider regional public good.

What are the challenges ahead?

- Countries differ in their technological capabilities, legal frameworks and willingness to share sensitive information.
- Concerns regarding data security and sovereignty may limit the extent of information-sharing.
- Maritime awareness is meaningful only when countries possess the institutional and operational capacity to act upon intelligence.
- Technology without trained personnel, effective coast guards and coordinated law enforcement can have limited impact.
- IPMDA must avoid becoming an explicitly military or anti-China mechanism.
- Its legitimacy will be stronger if it remains focused on common objectives such as maritime safety, illegal fishing, disaster response, environmental protection and freedom of navigation.

What could be done?

- **Strengthening data-sharing** - Establish interoperable systems that enable rapid exchange of maritime information.
- **Capacity building** - Provide training, technology and institutional support to smaller Indo-Pacific states.
- **Integrating civilian and military capabilities** - Combine commercial satellite data, coast guard information, naval assets and other sources.
- **Expanding partnerships** - Bring ASEAN, Pacific Island countries, Indian Ocean states and other like-minded partners into the IPMDA framework.
- **Building common standards** - Develop compatible legal and technical protocols for maritime information-sharing while respecting national sovereignty.

What lies ahead?

- The strategic environment of the Indo-Pacific has demonstrated that **open trade cannot be taken for granted**.
- Freedom of navigation, secure sea lanes and resilient supply chains require continuous monitoring and collective action.
- IPMDA provides a pragmatic mechanism through which countries can convert maritime transparency into strategic resilience.
- For India, it complements its role as a net security provider in the Indian Ocean; for the United States, it strengthens regional burden-sharing; and for smaller Indo-Pacific states, it offers access to capabilities that would otherwise be difficult to develop independently.
- Ultimately, **transparency can become a form of deterrence**.
- By ensuring that suspicious maritime activities cannot remain invisible, IPMDA can help protect freedom of navigation, counter illegal maritime activity and sustain the unimpeded flow of global commerce.
- Strengthening IPMDA, therefore, is not merely a maritime-security initiative—it is an investment in the stability of the global trading system.
