Why in News?

The Indian Navy's INSV Kaundinya has gone aboard on a journey from Porbandar in Gujarat to Muscat in Oman to test India's ancient seafaring traditions.

- **Origin** INSV Kaundinya is a *stitched sail ship* built using techniques believed to have been used in India during the 5th century CE.
- Launched in February 2025 and formally inducted into the Navy in May at Karwar, Karnataka.
- **Project Timeline** The project began in July 2023 through a **joint agreement** between the Ministry of Culture, the Indian Navy, and Hodi Innovations, with funding from the Ministry of Culture.
- Dimensions -
 - Length: 19.6 mWidth: 6.5 mDraft: 3.33 m.
- It is powered completely by sails and carries a crew of about 15 sailors.
- Design & Testing The design is based mainly on ships shown in the <u>Ajanta cave</u>
 <u>paintings</u>, along with descriptions from ancient texts and foreign travellers' accounts.
- It is recreated by the Navy, tested at IIT Madras for safety.
- Construction Team A team of traditional *craftsmen from Kerala*, led by master shipwright Babu Sankaran, stitched the ship by hand.
- Construction Technique The ship follows the <u>Tankai method</u>, a traditional Indian shipbuilding technique that *avoids metal entirely*.
- Materials used include -
 - Wooden planks.
 - Coir rope made from coconut fibre.
 - Natural resins and oils for waterproofing.
- Role Although it belongs to the Indian Navy, INSV Kaundinya is <u>not a combat</u>
 vessel it serves as a cultural and experimental craft reviving ancient maritime
 traditions.
- **Symbols on INSV Kaundinya** It carries several cultural symbols linked to India's maritime past:
 - Gandabherunda, the two-headed eagle of the Kadamba dynasty
 - **Sun motifs** on the sails

- Simha Yali, a mythical lion figure on the bow
- A Harappan-style **stone anchor** on the deck.



- Name & Legacy Named after Kaundinya, a 1st-century Indian mariner who sailed to the Mekong Delta, married Queen Soma, and helped establish the Kingdom of Funan in present-day Cambodia.
- **Significance** INSV Kaundinya voyage retraces the India-Oman sea trade corridor, revives spice/textile exchanges, showcases ancient maritime highways.
