- Kashmir is in political turmoil since the death of former Chief Minister Mufti Mohammad Sayeed in January 2016.

- The killing of Hizbul Mujahedeen commander Burhan Wani saw stone-pelting protesters taking to the streets in big numbers.
- Indiscriminate use of pellet guns by security forces to dispel protesters also added fuel to the resentment. \n
- The popularity of slain militants has only grown over the months and militant attacks on Kashmiri policemen has spiked.
- With regular ceasefire breaches by Pakistan on the border, the gains of the 2003 Ceasefire deal have effectively vanished. \n
- Intelligence estimates hold that more than 200 youth have taken to militancy since 2013.

• **Hope** - Dialogue is vital for suppressing hardliners and enabling a genuinely conciliatory environment.

- The begin of negotiations will also increase the legitimacy of the CM and contribute to better governance. \n
- Strategy More clarity is needed from the Centre on amount of freedom available to Mr. Sharma for the negotiations.
- \bullet Concious awareness that the recent NIA raids and other actions against seperatists could influence any outreach is needed. \n
- The interlocutor will have to consciously broadbase his schedule significantly to win the interest of civil society in the Valley. \n
