The Law Commission of India has recommended some changes with regard to BCCI.

What are the recommendations?

\n

• **Public body** - Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) should be declared a public body.

∖n

- The cricket board, as an entity, is permitted by the state to represent the country at the international stage.
 \n
- The ICC (International Cricket Council) recognises BCCI as the 'official' body representing India.

∖n

- It exercises 'state-like' powers in the regulation of cricket. $\ensuremath{\sc vn}$
- **RTI** It should be brought under RTI Act's purview for scrutiny by any citizen.

\n

- The board and all its member cricket associations should be brought under the Right to Information law regime. \n
- $\ensuremath{\text{NSF}}$ The BCCI virtually acts as a National Sports Federation (NSF). $\ensuremath{\sc vn}$
- Thus, the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports website should explicitly mention BCCI in the list of NSFs. \n
- This would automatically bring it within the purview of the RTI Act. $\slash n$

What is the need?

∖n

• **Functions** - The BCCI is a private body that needs no financial help from the government.

\n

- The SC also ruled in 2005 that the BCCI could not be termed an instrumentality of the 'State' under Article 12. \n
- However, subsequent developments have increasingly implied the public character of BCCI's functioning. \n
- **Rights** The board's monopolistic activities, directly and indirectly, affect the fundamental rights of stakeholders.

- These include citizens, players, and other functionaries. $\slash n$
- A private citizen should be able to move the highest court against the BCCI for any violation of fundamental rights. \n
- Concerns The board is currently veiled from public scrutiny. $\ensuremath{\sc vn}$
- It enjoys an environment of opacity and non-accountability. $\slash n$
- There are concerns of corruption and other forms of malpractices in the board.
 - \n
- It affects the general public's opinion on one of the most popular sports played in India.

• It has thus been felt for quite some time to make BCCI more transparent and accountable.

• The central government should consider seriously the recommendation of the Law Commission.

- The Supreme Court's intervention led to the constitution of the Justice R.M. Lodha Committee some time back. $\gamman{\car{l}}{\lambda}$
- It recommended sweeping reforms in the board's structure and the rules governing its administration. \n
- Implementing these reforms at both national and State levels could impart greater transparency in BCCI's functioning. \n
- It could lead to an overhaul of cricket administration in India and restore faith in the board and the sport. γ_n
