 KEY FEATURES 		
FEATURE	REQUIREMENT	
	Cold storage	Maintain 4°C–8°C temperature
	Minimum capacity	Storage for at least 4 bodies
	Body segregation	MLC and non-MLC bodies must be stored separately
	Body identification	Each body gets a unique serial number , linked to its storage cabin
	Location	Mortuary must be on the ground floor
	Basement ban	No morgues in basements
	Waste-area ban	Cannot be near hospital refuse/dumping areas
	Entry points	Dedicated and segregated entrances for movement of bodies
	Site requirements	Adequate lighting, ventilation and isolation
	Hospital location	Preferably at one end or slightly away from the main hospital building
	Staffing	Linked to the annual number of autopsies
	Up to 100 autopsies/year	2 doctors, 2 post-mortem technicians, 2 assistants + support staff
	Additional workload	For every additional 100 autopsies: 1 doctor + 1 technician + 1 assistant
	Photographer	Official photographer listed as desirable

Advantages of the system of appointment to the SC

India	USA
Ensure judicial independence - No executive interference.	President appoints, with the confirmation of senate.
Merit-based appointment - no reservation.	Highly transparent.
Protects separation of powers & Basic Structure Doctrine.	No retirement for judges (lifelong job)
Seniority-based appointment.	Clear checks and balances.
Strict removal procedures.	Democratic accountability through elected representatives.

Disadvantages of the system of appointment to the SC

India	USA
Non-transparent appointment - no accountability.	Extreme political influence.

Not having diverse representation.	Ideological polarization.
Delayed appointments.	Not having more chances for youth appointments due to lifelong service.
Gender inequality.	Lack of diversity due to presidential appointments.
Allegations of nepotism and favouritism ("Uncle Judge Syndrome").	Risk of compromising judicial independence.

Positive impact

- Higher tax devolution & strengthen decentralized developments
- Promotes cooperative federalism - NITI Aayog & GST Council.
- Performance-based transfers by Finance Commission.
- Greater fiscal transparency - FRBM framework.

Negative impact

- Growing of cess & surcharges
- GST Compensation issue

- Vertical fiscal imbalances – More revenue source to centre, but states are burdened with responsibilities.
- Increased in number of centrally sponsored schemes – burden to states.
