

② What are the lessons that India should learn from the recent standoff which occurred recently in Taiwan?

Introduction -

The recent visit by US-house speaker - Nancy Pelosi to Taiwan showed the potential of Taipei to go ahead & unwilling to step back from its declared aims

CHN - TAI standoff -

CHN claims Taiwan territory under "one china policy" & its continuous bullying by intruding into Taiwan's Air space. Taiwan in return making its red line clear to Beijing bravely.

Mistakes Committed by India vizaviz Taiwan:-

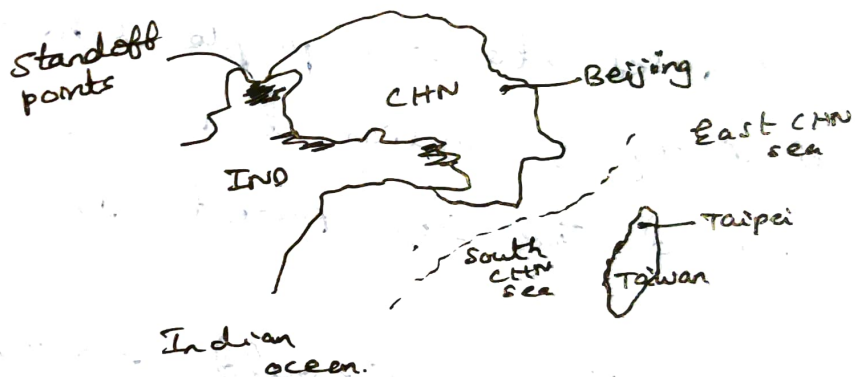
① meeting/ hosting Chinese leaders while PLA violating the norms of LAC is a deeply flawed one.

② non-acknowledgment of Chinese intrusion into Indian territories in 2020 is a gravest mistake by India.

③ India's soft-peddling towards QUAD moves when china objected to it is an another mistake as only in the recent years QUAD enthusiasm picked up.

④ India's relation with Taiwan declined as no parliamentary delegation (or) legislative heads visited Taiwan since 2017 Doklam standoff.

⑤ Experts argued that diplomacy must go on despite problems on the borders.



Lessons should be learnt from Taiwan :-

* Though a small island nation with 23 million population standing against Superpowers country showing its bravery globally

[whereas Ind with 1.4 million military personnels of nuclear weapons still hesitant to call china's bluff]

* New Delhi should articulate red lines & makes it clear for Beijing in an unambiguous manner.

* Though Trade relation (↑) continuous India should voice its border concern bravely ^{even} as if trade decline it will be a huge loss to Beijing than India due to India's trade deficit with CHN.

* Current policy of "Hide & seek" by India confuses its own people whether PLA captures & occupies Indian territories therefore it should be transparent in the standoff.

* India should continue trade with CHN as far as possible but not in its term as Taiwan does.

Conclusion - India should continue its trade relation with Taiwan amid threats & voice its concern bravely we could counter CHN's threats.
