Q. Separate ministry for animal husbandry can bring fresh momentum to the growth of livestock sector. Do you agree with this view? Critically analyse.

Ans:

Livestock and fisheries have together registered an average growth rate of six times more than that in the crop sector between 2012-13 to 2016-17. By considering the growing demand, a separate ministry of animal husbandry, dairying and fisheries is created at the earliest time.

Benefits :-

- Now the ministry can independently regulate this sector, which was previously under the MoA&FW and treated as a sub sector or allied sector.
- The policy focus of MoA&FW is highly skewed towards the crop cultivation sector which neglected the livestock sector despite of their growing significance. For eg. PM KISAN scheme.
- India is largest producer of milk and second largest producer in the field of fisheries. So this sector deserved to have a separate ministry fully dedicated ^{towards} its development.

→ As this sector now come under a full fledged ministry, it will have significantly higher budget allocation.

→ It will further help in assessment of actual situation and exact growth figures of agricultural sector which was previously adjusted with livestock sector.

Challenges :-

→ Both these sectors are integrally linked to each other. It will create conflicts between two ministries at the time of policy making.

→ It might further encourage fisheries dept to create separate ministry of its own for the sake of blue revolution.

→ It may lead to bifurcation of govt and quasi govt agencies like Indian council of Agricultural Research (ICAR) & National Agricultural Research Council (NARC) into separate agencies of agriculture and veterinary/fisheries.

→ Different policies can affect there farmers who practise both agriculture and livestock in off season.

As livestock sector plays a vital role in country's economy, an independent ministry can help to push its growth to the next level. But to ensure this, a smooth coordination with agricultural sector is necessary.
