- Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi has recently announced that an ancient idol of the goddess Annapurna, stolen from India about a century ago, is being brought back from Canada.
- Annapurna is the goddess of food. The 18thcentury idol, carved in the Benares style was smuggled out of the country around 100 years ago somewhere around 1913.
- Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) is the official custodian of all such repatriated artefacts.

2. c

- Arunachal is first in the country to obtain Organic Certification for its wild Kiwi under Mission Organic Value Chain Development for North East Region (MOVCD-NER).
- Kiwis of Ziro Valley located in Lower Subansiri district were certified as organic following a standard three-year-process.
- The kiwis of the region are the only certified organic fruit of their kind in the country.
- Certification helps producers and handlers, they receive premium prices for the products, and have access to fast-growing, local, regional and international markets.



Organic Farming

- An agricultural practice/product is considered organic when there are no chemical fertilisers or pesticides involved in its cultivation process.
- Such certifications in India can be obtained after strict scientific assessment done by the regulatory body, Agricultural and Processed Food Products Export Development Authority (APEDA).

- The Italian Culture Ministry has recently announced the discovery of well-preserved remains of two men, who perished during the volcanic eruption of Mount Vesuvius in 79 AD.
- The eruption was a catastrophic event that destroyed the ancient Roman city of Pompeii and killed around 16,000 people.

Mount Vesuvius

- It is located in southern Italy near the coastal city of Naples.
- The 4,203-ft (1,281 metres) tall Vesuvius is the only active volcano in mainland Europe.
- Vesuvius has been classified as a complex volcano (also called a compound volcano), one that consists of a complex of two or more vents.
- Vesuvius typically has explosive eruptions and pyroclastic flows— defined as a high-density mix of hot lava blocks, pumice, ash and volcanic gas.

4. c

Mission Organic Value Chain Development for North East Region (MOVCD-NER)

- It is a Central Sector Scheme, a sub-mission under National Mission for Sustainable Agriculture (NMSA), launched by the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare for implementation in the states of Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, Manipur, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Nagaland, Sikkim and Tripura, during the 12th plan period.
- The scheme aims to development of certified organic production in a value chain mode to link growers with consumers and to support the development of entire value chain starting from inputs, seeds, certification, to the

creation of facilities for collection, aggregation, processing, marketing and brand building initiative.

 The United Nations has recently launched the Sanitation and Hygiene Fund.

UN Sanitation and Hygiene Fund

- It will fund countries with high burden of diseases stemming from lack of sanitation services and have the least ability to respond to them
- The fund is hosted by the UN Office for Project Services (UNOPS), which provides technical advice and project implementation to the UN and its partners.

The objectives of the Fund are:

- 1. Expanding household sanitation
- 2. Ensuring menstrual health and hygiene
- 3. Providing sanitation and hygiene in schools and healthcare facilities
- 4. Supporting innovative sanitation solutions

Brereton Report

- The Inspector-General of the Australian Defence Force Afghanistan Inquiry Report is commonly known as the Brereton Report.
- It is a report into war crimes committed by the Australian Defence Force (ADF) during the War in Afghanistan between 2005 and 2016.
- The report found evidence of 39 murders of civilians and prisoners by (or at the instruction of) members of the Australian special forces, which were subsequently covered up by ADF personnel.
- The unlawful killings discussed by the report began in 2009, with most occurring in 2012 and 2013.

7. c

RT-LAMP Technology

• The RT-LAMP test is Reverse Transcriptase loop-mediated isothermal amplification technology.



- It is a one-step nucleic acid amplification method to multiply specific sequences of RNA of the coronavirus.
- Under this technology, the RNA is first made into cDNA (copy DNA) by the usual reverse transcription and then, the DNA is amplified by the LAMP technique.
- The important advantage of the LAMP technology is that the assay is so fast that results can be obtained within 30 minutes and positive samples are amplified as early as 10 minutes.
- The LAMP technology does not need laborious preparation as in the case of RT-PCR.
- The LAMP technology has been recently validated by the Indian Council of Medical Research with sensitivity 98.7% and specificity 100%.

Zebra Fish

- Zebrafish is a small (2-3 cm long) freshwater fish found in the tropical and subtropical regions.
- The fish is native to South Asia's Indo-Gangetic plains, where they are mostly found in the paddy fields and even in stagnant water and streams.
- The fish become adults at three months and survive 2-3 years in a laboratory condition.
- A zebrafish attracts developmental biologists due to its adequate regeneration capacity of almost all its organs, including the brain, heart, eye, spinal cord.
- Recently scientists at Pune-based Agharkar Research Institute have used this tiny animal model and identified genes that can promote heart regeneration.

Dev Deepavali

- It is also known as "Diwali of the Gods"
- It is the festival of Kartik Poornima celebrated in Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh, India.
- It falls on the full moon of the Hindu month of Kartika (November December) and takes place fifteen days after Diwali.

- The gods are believed to descend to Earth to bathe in the Ganges on this day.
- The festival is also observed as Tripura Purnima Snan.

Aadi Mahotsav

- The Aadi Mahotsav is a unique celebration of the spirit of tribal culture, crafts, cuisine and commerce.
- It is a 10 day long festival, celebrated annually commenced in 2017.
- It is organized by TRIFED under Union Tribal Affairs Ministry.
- The festival is an attempt to familiarize the people with the rich and diverse craft and culture of the tribal communities across the country, in one place.

- Indian Oil Corporation (IOC) has recently launched the nation's first 100 Octane petrol.
- It helps India join a select league of nations globally that have such superior quality fuel.

XP100

 Branded as XP100, the premium grade petrol was launched across ten cities in India.

- It will initially be available at select outlet of IOC in 10 cities -- Delhi, Gurgaon, Noida, Agra, Jaipur, Chandigarh, Ludhiana, Mumbai, Pune and Ahmedabad.
- IOC plans to roll out XP100 premium grade petrol in the second phase in Chennai, Bengaluru, Hyderabad, Kochi and Kolkata.
- The fuel is manufactured at IOC's Mathura refinery in Uttar Pradesh and supplied at select petrol pumps.
- Previously, the nation leapfrogged from BS-IV (Euro-IV) emission compliant fuel to BS-VI from April 1 this year.

Octane ratings

- They are measures of *fuel stability*.
- It is a measure of a fuel's ability to avoid knock.
- Knock occurs when fuel is prematurely ignited in the engine's cylinder, which degrades efficiency and can be damaging to the engine.
- The higher the octane number, the more resistant the petrol mixture is to knock.
- Worldwide, 100 Octane petrol has a niche market for *luxury vehicles that demand high performance* and is available only in six countries of USA, Germany, Greece, Indonesia, Malaysia and Israel.
- At most retail stations, three octane grade are offered, 87 (regular), 89 (mid-grade) and 91-94 (premium).
- Hindustan Petroleum Corporation Ltd (HPCL) had recently launched Octane 99 and now IOC has come to the market with XP100.

- World Health Organisation has recently released the World Malaria Report 2020.
- According to the report, India made impressive gains in the global fight against malaria, recording the largest reduction in cases in South-East Asia from 20 million in 2000 to about 5.6 million last year.
- India also recorded a decrease in the number of deaths from malaria between 2000 and 2019.



- Malaria deaths in India declined from about 29,500 in 2000 to about 7,700 last year, the report said.
- In the WHO South-East Asia Region, malaria deaths reduced by 74 per cent, from about 35,000 in 2000 to 9,000 in 2019.
- India, however, still accounted for 88 per cent of malaria cases and 86 per cent of malaria deaths in the WHO South-East Asia Region in 2019.

• The Government of India has recently constituted the Apex Committee for the Implementation of the Paris Agreement (AIPA).

Apex Committee for the Implementation of the Paris Agreement (AIPA)

Composition

• The Secretary, Union Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change (MoEFCC) will be the chairperson and the additional secretary, MoEFCC will be the vice chairperson of the committee

Functions

It has been constituted with the purpose of ensuring:

- 1. a coordinated response on climate change matters that protects the country's interests
- 2. India is on track towards meeting its climate change obligations under the Paris Agreement including its submitted Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs).
- The AIPA has the responsibility of regularly communicating and reporting the NDCs to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC).
- It will also define the responsibilities of the government ministries that would be crucial in achieving the country's climate change mitigation and adaptation goals and submit a report every six months.
- The AIPA will also act as a national authority for the regulation of carbon markets in India under the Article 6.2, Article 6.4 and Article 6.8 of the Paris Agreement.

Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs)

 They are the accounts of the voluntary efforts to be made by countries that are a part of the Paris Agreement, to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and mitigate the impacts of anthropogenic climate change.

The three quantitative goals in the Indian NDCs are:

- 1. A 33-35 per cent reduction in the gross domestic product emissions intensity by 2030 from 2005 levels
- 2. A 40 per cent share of non-fossil fuel based electricity by 2030
- 3. Creating a carbon sink of 2.5-3 billion tonnes of carbon dioxide through afforestation programmes
- Apart from these, there are five other nonquantitive goals in the Indian NDCs.
- The NDCs are to be implemented in the post-2020 period.
- India had submitted its NDCs in 2015.
- Now, the AIPA, with its 17 members, has the responsibility of formulating policies and programmes for implementing them.

- A research study published in Scientific Reports recently suggests that around four billion years ago floods of unimaginable magnitude washed through Gale Crater on Mars' equator.
- The research findings were ascertained from the data collected by NASA's Curiosity rover.
- This research puts a stamp on the possibility of supporting microbial life on the fourth planet of our solar system.

Gale Crater

- Gale Crater formed when a meteor hit Mars in its early history, about 3.5 to 3.8 billion years ago.
- The meteor impact punched a hole in the terrain.
- The explosion ejected rocks and soil that landed around the crater.
- Gale crater has always fascinated the scientists as the Curiosity rover science team has already



confirmed that it was once home to persistent lakes and streams.

• Scientists chose Gale Crater as the landing site for Curiosity because it has many signs that water was present over its history.

Peacock soft-shelled turtle

- Peacock soft-shelled turtle is a turtle of a vulnerable species under IUCN.
- They have a large head which is olive green in colour.
- This species is confined to India, Bangladesh and Pakistan.
- It is widespread in North eastern and central parts of the Indian subcontinent.
- These are found in rivers, streams, lakes and ponds with mud or sand bottoms.
- It is placed under Wildlife Protection Act, 1972: Schedule I, CITES: Appendix I.
- The species is heavily exploited for its meat and calipee (the outer cartilaginous rim of the shell).

7. c

National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme

- Under Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act, 2005, the NREGS was introduced.
- The Act aims at enhancing the livelihood security of people in rural areas by guaranteeing hundred days of wage employment in a financial year to a rural household whose adult members (at least 18 years of age) volunteer to do unskilled work.
- The central government bears the full cost of unskilled labour, and 75% of the cost of material (the rest is borne by the states).
- It is a demand-driven, social security and labour law that aims to enforce the 'right to work'.
- Ministry of Rural Development in association with state governments, monitors the implementation of the scheme.

- The NREGS is a demand-based scheme and has emerged as a safety net during the pandemic for jobless migrant workers returning to their villages
- Despite a progressive relaxation in Covid-19 curbs to revive the economy, 96% gram panchayats have logged work under the scheme in the financial year (2020-21) as compared to previous seven years.

8. c

Super Infections

- These are infection occurring after or on top of an earlier infection, especially following treatment with broad-spectrum antibiotics.
- It is an overgrowth of an opportunistic pathogen from the bacterial or yeast imbalance of systemic antibiotics.
- For example, influenza is caused by a virus, but the most common cause of death in influenza patients is secondary pneumonia, which is caused by bacteria.
- However, the reason behind influenza infections leading to an increased risk of bacterial pneumonia is not known.
- When an individual is infected by influenza different nutrients and antioxidants, such as vitamin C, leak from the blood.
- The absence of nutrients and antioxidants creates a favourable environment for bacteria in the lungs.
- The bacteria adapt to the inflammatory environment by increasing the production of an enzyme called High temperature requirement A (HtrA).
- The presence of HtrA weakens the immune system and promotes bacterial growth in the influenza-infected airways.

9. d

Mount Ili Lewotolok

- It is located on Lembata island of East Nusa Tenggara province in Indonesia.
- It is one of the three currently erupting in Indonesia along with Merapi on Java Island and Sinabung on Sumatra Island.



 Mount Ili Lewotolok has been erupting on and off since October 2017.

Tree Rings

- The tree rings grow wider in years when soil moisture is high.
- Indirectly, wider rings reflect more rainfall and higher river runoff.
- Recently a new study analysed that the existing projections of the Brahmaputra flooding are based on observations of rainfall patterns.
- The study looked at rings of ancient trees sampled at 28 sites in Tibet, Myanmar, Nepal and Bhutan, at sites close enough to be affected by the same weather systems as the Brahmaputra watershed.
- The study is based on examinations of tree rings, which showed rainfall patterns going back seven centuries i.e. long before discharge records were compiled.
- The rings showed that the post-1950s period was actually one of the driest since the 1300s.

• The President of India, in exercise of the power conferred by clause (l) of Article 224 of the Constitution of India, appointed 10 persons as Additional Judges of the Madras High Court.

Additional and Acting Judges

The President can appoint duly qualified persons as additional judges of a high court *for a temporary period not exceeding two years* when:

- 1. there is a temporary increase in the business of the high court; or
- 2. there are arrears of work in the high court.

The President can also appoint a duly qualified person as an acting judge of a high court when a judge of that high court (other than the chief justice) is:

- 1. unable to perform the duties of his office due to absence or any other reason; or
- 2. appointed to act temporarily as chief justice of that high court.
- An acting judge holds office until the permanent judge resumes his office.
- However, both the additional or acting judge cannot hold office after attaining the age of 62 years.

 Union Minister of Science & Technology, Earth Sciences and Health & Family Welfare Dr. Harsh Vardhan inaugurates the ecofriendly and efficient Phytorid Technology Sewage Treatment Plant (STP) at CSIR-National Chemical Laboratory (NCL)-Pune, developed by CSIR- National Environmental Engineering Research Institute (NEERI), Nagpur and CSIR-NCL.

PHYTORID

- It is a subsurface mixed flow constructed wetland system developed and internationally patented by CSIR-NEERI, Nagpur with successful demonstration in the field for more than 10 years of continuous operation as a stand-alone sewage treatment system.
- Phytorid is a self-sustainable technology for wastewater treatment that works on the principle of natural wetland.
- It uses certain specific plants which can absorb nutrients directly from wastewater but do not require soil.
- These plants act as nutrient sinker and remover.
- Using Phytorid Technology for the treatment of sewage, it is possible to recover and reuse the treated water for gardening purposes.
- CSIR-NCL is the first CSIR laboratory to use NEERI Phytorid water treatment technology.
- Compared to the conventional processes, this natural system based Phytorid Technology for sewage treatment is zero energy and zero operation & maintenance (O&M).

- The International Financial Services Centres Authority (IFSCA) has recently obtained membership of International Association of Insurance Supervisors (IAIS).

International Association of Insurance Supervisors (IAIS)



- It was established in 1994.
- It is headquartered in Switzerland.
- It is a voluntary membership organization of insurance supervisors and regulators from more than 200 jurisdictions, constituting 97% of the world's insurance premiums.
- It is the international standard-setting body responsible for developing and assisting in the implementation of principles, standards and other supporting material for the supervision of the insurance sector.
- The IAIS also provides a forum for Members to share their experiences and understanding of insurance supervision and insurance markets.

Benefits for IFSCA

- With this membership IFSCA would have access to IAIS's global network and would be able to exchange ideas and information with other global regulators.
- This would help in developing a vibrant global Insurance hub in IFSC at GIFT City.
- Currently, 17 leading Insurance entities are operating from GIFT IFSC undertaking offshore Insurance and Reinsurance business.
- This membership would go a long way in connecting IFSC with global insurance institutions and would facilitate IFSCA in joint development of global insurance business with other global centres.

Armed forces Flag Day Fund (AFFDF)

• It has been constituted by the Government of India for the welfare and rehabilitation of the Ex-Servicemen (ESM) community.

- It has been utilised for providing financial assistance to needy Ex-Servicemen, War widows and their Dependents; and the Institutions involved in rehabilitation of the Ex-Servicemen, War widows and their Dependents.
- Kendriya Sainik Board is responsible for administration of AFFDF.
- The AFFDF is operated by a Managing Committee, headed by Union Defence Minister at the Centre and Governor / Lt Governor at the State / UT level.
- Kendriya Sainik Board (KSB) formulates and operates various welfare and rehabilitation schemes for Ex Servicemen (ESM) and their dependents through Rajya Sainik Boards (RSBs) and Zila Sainik Boards (ZSBs) colocated in the State Capitals and District HQs respectively, across the country.
- Contributions to AFFDF are exempted from Income Tax.
- Corporate contributions to AFFDF are also eligible for fulfilling the CSR obligation under section 135 of Companies Act, 2013.

• The Vice President of India, Shri M. Venkaiah Naidu had recently addressed the 18th meeting of the Governing Council of Indian Council of World Affairs (ICWA) in virtual mode.

Indian Council of World Affairs (ICWA)

- It was established in 1943 by a group of eminent intellectuals led by Sir Tej Bahadur Sapru and Dr. H.N. Kunzru.
- Its principal objective was to create an Indian perspective on international relations and act as a repository of knowledge and thinking on foreign policy issues.
- It was registered as a non-official, non-political and non-profit organisation under the Registration of Societies Act 1860.
- By an Act of Parliament in 2001, the Indian Council of World Affairs has been declared an institution of national importance.
- The ICWA is **funded by the Ministry of External Affairs** and enjoys full autonomy.



• It has a General Body and Governing Council, headed by Hon'ble Vice President of the Republic of India who is the ex-officio President of the ICWA.

Emergency Use Authorisation

- Vaccines and medicines, and even diagnostic tests and medical devices, require the approval of a regulatory authority before they can be administered.
- The approval for vaccines and medicines is granted after an assessment of their safety and effectiveness, based on data from trials.
- In emergency situations, regulatory authorities around the world have developed mechanisms to grant interim approvals if there is sufficient evidence to suggest a medical product is safe and effective.
- The final approval is granted only after completion of the trials and analysis of full data and until then, emergency use authorisation (EUA) allows the medicine or the vaccine to be used on the public.
- In India, the regulatory authority for giving grants like EAU is the Central Drugs Standard Control Organisation (CDSCO).
- India's drug regulations do not have provisions for an EUA, and the process for receiving one is not clearly defined or consistent.
- The CDSCO has been granting emergency or restricted emergency approvals to Covid-19 drugs such as remdesivir, favipiravir and itolizumab.

COVID pneumonia

- COVID pneumonia is the critical manifestation of COVID infection.
- It may start with symptoms like fever, shortness of breath, fatigue, coughing, chest pain etc.
- It is a condition in which the infection starts damaging the tissues of lower respiratory tract.
- It results in conditions like shortness of breath and severe cough, which may lead a patient to

the ventilator or supplemental oxygen under severe care condition"

- COVID-infected patients may or may not be affected by COVID pneumonia, as it occurs with diverse or no apparent symptoms.
- Regular pneumonia is caused by bacteria or virus that inflames lungs, causes pus or phlegm in the lungs and the supply of oxygen is affected which causes shortness in breath.
- In the case of bacterial pneumonia, there are more chances of patients getting completely cured.
- But in the case of COVID pneumonia, it involves lung tissues as well which may lead to post-COVID complications.

Recently the Roshni Act was scrapped and declared "unconstitutional" by the Jammu and Kashmir High Court which fell prey to corruption over the course of the last decade.

Roshini Act

- J&K's Roshni Act was targeted to earn Rs.25,000 crore by transferring 20 lakh kanals of State land to existing occupants against payment at market rates.
- It was implemented with the aim of boosting the farming sector and "generating substantial revenue" for funding power projects.
- The land-related law, popularly known as the Roshni Act, was brought into force in 2001.
- The law aimed to grant ownership rights of public land to occupants.
- The Act also sought the conferment of proprietary rights of around 20.55 lakh kanals of land (1250 hectares) to the occupants.
- The law initially set 1990 as the cut-off year for encroachment on State land, based on which ownership would be granted.

Theremin

- The Theremin is an electronic musical instrument controlled without physical contact by the thereminist (performer).
- The instrument was invented in 1920.



- It is named after its inventor, Leon Theremin, who patented the device in 1928.
- The instrument's controlling section usually consists of two metal antennas that sense the relative position of the thereminist's hands and control oscillators for frequency with one hand, and amplitude (volume) with the other.
- The electric signals from the theremin are amplified and sent to a loudspeaker.

Contempt of Courts

- The Contempt of Courts Act, 1971, lays down the law on contempt of court.
- Section 15 of the legislation describes the procedure on how a case for contempt of court can be initiated.
- In the case of the Supreme Court, the Attorney General or the Solicitor General may bring in a motion before the court for initiating a case of criminal contempt.
- In the case of High Courts, the Advocate General, may bring in a motion before the court for initiating a case of criminal contempt.
- However, if the motion is brought by any other person, the consent in writing of the Attorney General or the Advocate General is required.
- The objective behind requiring the consent of the Attorney General before taking cognizance of a complaint is to save the time of the court.
- The AG's consent is mandatory when a private citizen wants to initiate a case of contempt of court against a person.
- However, when the court itself initiates a contempt of court case, the AG's consent is not required.
- This is because the court is exercising its inherent powers under the Constitution to punish for contempt and such Constitutional powers cannot be restricted because the AG declined to grant consent.

• A first-of-its-kind study by the Zoological Survey of India (ZSI) under the Union Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, has projected that numbers of the Malayan Giant Squirrel (Ratufa bicolor) could decline by 90 per cent in India by 2050, and if urgent steps are not taken, the species could be extinct in the country in subsequent decades.

Malayan Giant Squirrel

• It is one of the world's largest squirrel species that has a dark upper body, pale under parts, and a long, bushy tail, is currently found in parts of West Bengal, Sikkim, Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Meghalaya, and Nagaland.

- Destruction of its habitat could restrict the squirrel to only southern Sikkim and North Bengal by 2050, according to the ZSI.
- India is home to three giant squirrel species.
- The ZSI study says the health of the species is critical because it indicates the health of the forests it inhabits.
- The Malayan Giant Squirrel is also distributed through Southern China, Thailand, Laos, Vietnam, Burma, the Malayan Peninsula, Sumatra, and Java.
- It is found mostly in evergreen and semievergreen forests, from plains to hills at elevations of 50 m to 1,500 m above sea level.
- In India, some 20% of the population of the species is found at elevations between 1,500 m and 2,700 m; the rest live in the plains and up to 1,500 m.
- India is home to three giant squirrel species, the other two *Indian Giant Squirrel and Grizzled Giant Squirrel* are found in peninsular India.
- Unlike the nocturnal flying squirrels, giant squirrels are diurnal, but arboreal (tree-dwelling) and herbivorous like the flying squirrels.

Technical Textiles in India

- India shares nearly 6% of world market size of 250 Billion USD.
- However, the annual average growth of the segment is 12%, as compared to 4% world average growth.
- Penetration level of technical textiles is low in India at 5-10%, against 30-70% in advanced countries.

National Technical Textiles Mission

- It aims to position India as a global leader in Technical Textiles.
- The Mission would have a four year implementation period from FY 2020-21 to 2023-24.
- Constitution of an Export Promotion Council for Technical Textiles is part of one of the components of the National Technical Textiles Mission.

State of the Global Climate Provisional Report

- This report was released by the World Meteorological Organization.
- The decade 2011-2020 would be the warmest ever on record.
- Also, the year 2020 is set to be among the three warmest on record.

- The record heat in 2020 has been despite La Niña conditions prevailing in the equatorial Pacific Ocean.
- Scientific evidence indicates increasing temperatures are a direct result of human-led global warming, an impact of Green House Gas emission.
- After record GHG levels of 2019, there has been a slight dip this year due to measures taken by countries to fight the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.
- Global sea-level rise was similar to 2019 values and the general decreasing trend has continued.
- Extreme weather events such as tropical cyclones, floods, heavy rainfall and droughts which are an expensive consequence of global warming impacted many parts of the world.
- The report states that climate induced human migration is one of the least understood impact of anthropogenic climate change.

- The second-largest single-dish radio telescope in the world, it was first built in 1963.
- Arecibo was used to observe planets, asteroids and the ionosphere, making several discoveries



over the decades, including finding prebiotic molecules in distant galaxies, the first exoplanets, and the first millisecond pulsar.

- In 1967, Arecibo was able to discover that the planet Mercury rotates in 59 days and not 88 days as had been originally thought.
- In the following decades, it also served as a hub in the search for extra-terrestrial life, and would look for radio signals from alien civilisations.
- Arecibo also played a key role in tracking killer asteroids heading towards Earth.

Voting Rights for NRI

- In 2015, a panel recommended that NRIs should be given the "additional alternative options of e-postal ballot and proxy voting", apart from voting in person.
- Under proxy voting, a registered elector can delegate his voting power to a representative.
- The Law Ministry accepted the recommendation on proxy voting.
- The Union Cabinet passed the proposal on proxy voting rights for NRIs in 2017.
- The government then brought a Bill amending the Representation of the People Act 1950.
- The Bill was passed by Lok Sabha and was awaiting Rajya Sabha's approval when it lapsed with the dissolution of the 16th Lok Sabha.
- This proposal hasn't been revived yet.

• The Minister of Science and Technology and Vice President of Council for Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR), Dr Harsh Vardhan virtually inaugurated the 2nd TCGA 2020 conference in New Delhi recently.

The Cancer Genome Atlas (TCGA)

- It is a landmark cancer genomics program that molecularly characterized over 20,000 primary cancer and matched normal samples spanning 33 cancer types.
- This joint effort between the US- National Cancer Institute and the National Human Genome Research Institute began in 2006, bringing together researchers from diverse disciplines and multiple institutions.
- Over the years, TCGA generated over 2.5 petabytes of genomic, epigenomic, transcriptomic, and proteomic data.
- The data, which has already led to improvements in the ability to diagnose, treat, and prevent cancer, will remain publicly available for anyone in the research community to use.

Indian Cancer Genomics Atlas (ICGA)

• On similar lines, the establishment of an 'Indian Cancer Genomics Atlas (ICGA)' has been initiated by a consortium of key stakeholders in India led by CSIR, Government of India in which several government agencies, cancer hospitals, academic institutions and private sector partners.

- Ministry of Information and Broadcasting has recently issued an advisory on Advertisements on Online gaming, fantasy sports and others.
- It has asked all the broadcasters that the guidelines issued by the Advertising Standards Council of India, ASCI are complied with.

Advertising Standards Council of India (ASCI)

- It is a *self-regulatory voluntary organization* of the Advertising Industry established in 1985 to maintain and enhance the public's confidence in Advertising.
- It is committed to the cause of **Self-Regulation in Advertising**, **ensuring the protection of the interests of consumers**.
- ASCI was formed with the support of all four sectors connected with Advertising, viz. Advertisers, Advertising Agencies, Media (including Broadcasters and the Press) and others like PR Agencies, Market Research Companies etc.
- The *Consumer Complaints Council* is ASCI's heart and soul.
- It is the dedicated work put in by this group of highly respected people that has given tremendous impetus to the work of ASCI and the movement of self- regulation in the advertising.

- The United Kingdom has recently become the first country in the world to approve of a COVID-19 vaccine developed by Pfizer Inc and its German partner BioNTech SE.
- The British regulator, the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA), says the vaccination, which claims to



offer up to 95 per cent protection against Covid-19 illness, is safe for roll out.

• India in September 2020, has joined the Djibouti Code of Conduct as an observer which is expected to provide it a strategic heft in the Indian Ocean region.

The Djibouti Code of Conduct/Jeddah Amendment (DCOC/JA)

- It is a regional maritime security cooperation agreement established by the International Maritime Organization (IMO) in 2008.
- It was initially focused on piracy and armed robbery against ships in the Western Indian Ocean Region, the Gulf of Aden and the Red Sea
- It was later extended to cover environmental issues as well in 2017.
- It comprises 19 member states adjoining the Red Sea, the Gulf of Aden and the East coast of Africa.
- India has joined Japan, Norway, the UK and the US as observers of the grouping.
- India's joining of the grouping comes at a time China has been making concerted efforts to expand its military influence in the Indian Ocean Region.

Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam (GERD) Dispute

- The conflict between Egypt, Sudan, and Ethiopia dates back to May 2011 when Ethiopia started building the Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam (GERD); Egypt voiced concern over its water share.
- In 2015, the three countries signed the Declaration of Principles, per which the downstream countries should not be negatively affected by the construction of the dam.
- In 2019, Egypt blamed Addis Ababa for hindering a final agreement concerning a technical problem, calling for mediation.
- Ethiopia is responsible for the failure of reaching a comprehensive agreement with the Nile downstream countries [Egypt and Sudan] regarding the operation and the filling of its dam.

• Another round of tripartite negotiations between Foreign Ministers and Water Ministers of Egypt, Sudan, and Ethiopia on the controversial Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam (GERD) kicked off recently.

5. d

- Going ahead with its plan to shift the Rohingyas from Cox's Bazar refugee camp, the *Bangladesh government* has recently started the process of relocating them to the newly developed facility at the *Bhashan char Island*.
- International Human Rights groups are opposing the relocation of Rohingyas to the Bhashan Char.
- They demand independent assessment of the liveability on the Bhashan char by the UN and humanitarian agencies before the process is started.

Bhashan char

- It is an uninhabited island where the government of Bangladesh has made shelter houses for one lakh Rohingya refugees at an estimated cost of Tk. 2,300 crore.
- The environmentalists say that the Bhashan char falls in an ecologically fragile area prone to floods, erosion and cyclones.
- Currently more than a million Rohingya are living in refugee camps in Bangladesh after fleeing the military crackdown in the Rakhine province of Myanmar in August 2017.

6. c

Operation Trident

- Under Operation Trident, the Indian Navy sank three vessels near the Pakistani port city of Karachi in 1971 war.
- The stars of the mission were the then-recently acquired Soviet Osa missile boats, fitted with 4 SS-N-2 (P-15) Styx missiles.
- INS Kiltan, Katchall, Nipat, Nighat and Veer sank PNS Khaibar killing 222 Pakistani sailors, and PNS Muhafiz killing 33 Pakistani sailors.
- Operation Trident resulted in the first use of anti-ship missiles in the region as well as the first sinking of naval vessels during hostilities in the region since World War II.



• The Navy plans to celebrate 2021 as 'Swarnim Vijay Varsh' as part of commemorating the 50th anniversary of the victory in the 1971 war.

7. b

Minimum Support Price

- The Commission for Agricultural Costs & Prices (CACP) recommends MSPs for 22 mandated crops and fair and remunerative price (FRP) for sugarcane.
- CACP is an attached office of the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare.
- The CACP projects three kinds of production cost for every crop, both at state and all-India average levels.
- 1. 'A2' Covers all paid-out costs directly incurred by the farmer in cash and kind on seeds, fertilisers, pesticides, hired labour, leased-in land, fuel, irrigation, etc.
- 2. 'A2+FL' Includes A2 plus an imputed value of unpaid family labour.
- 3. 'C2' It is a more comprehensive cost that factors in rentals and interest forgone on owned land and fixed capital assets, on top of A2+FL.
- CACP considers all costs in a comprehensive manner which is based on the methodology recommended by Expert Committees from time to time.
- CACP considers both A2+FL and C2 costs while recommending MSP.
- CACP reckons only A2+FL cost for return. However, C2 costs are used by CACP primarily as benchmark reference costs.

8. c

Cultured Meat

- Plant based meat is made from plant sources such as soy or pea protein, while cultured meat is grown directly from cells in a laboratory.
- It aims to offer alternatives to traditional meat products that could feed a lot more people, reduce the threat of zoonotic diseases, and mitigate the environmental impact of meat consumption.
- In terms of cellular structure, cultured or cultivated meat is the same as conventional

- meat, except that cultured meat does not come directly from animals.
- Cultivated meat is created in clean facilities, that don't have the risk of contamination by pathogens such as salmonella and E coli, which may be present in traditional slaughterhouses and meat-packing factories.
- It does not require antibiotics either, unlike animals raised for meat, thereby reducing the threat posed to public health by growing antibiotic resistance.

Cannabis Drug

- According to the WHO, cannabis is a generic term used to denote the several psychoactive preparations of the plant Cannabis sativa.
- The major psychoactive constituent in cannabis is Delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol (THC).
- The WHO says that cannabis is by far the most widely cultivated, trafficked and abused illicit drug in the world.
- India was part of the voting majority, along with the US and most European nations whereas China, Pakistan and Russia were among those who voted against.
- In India, the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act, 1985, illegalises any mixture with or without any neutral material, of any of the two forms of cannabis i.e. charas and ganja or any drink prepared from it.

- PEN stands for Poets, Playwrights, Editors, Essayists, and Novelists, is one of the world's oldest human rights organisations championing the freedom to write and read.
- It is the founding centre of PEN International, a worldwide writers' association with 145 centres in more than 100 countries.



- The award is given in the memory of Marjorie Hessell-Tiltman, a member PEN Literary Foundation.

Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA)

- Former President Barack Obama instituted DACA by executive order in 2012 to help some of the more than 10 million people estimated to be living in America without documentation.
- DACA protected an estimated 7,00,000 people known as Dreamers, offering protection at renewable two-year periods, including authorization to work.
- It applied to people who were brought into the United States illegally as children and then grew up here. For many it is the only country they have ever known.
- As part of his crackdown on all kinds of immigration, Mr. Trump moved to end the programme in 2017, calling it unconstitutional.
- After the restoration, more than 3,00,000 new applicants could now be eligible for DACA, the Center for American Progress think tank said.
- Prospects for Dreamers to live and work in the US permanently, rather than just with renewable permits, remain unclear.
- President-elect Joe Biden has vowed to restore DACA when he takes office in January.

- A recent study on the Giant African Snail (Achatina fulica) in Asia and Africa has found that the dangerous pest species had multiple episodes of invasion in India, particularly Kerala, and that new snail populations continue to arrive in India from snail-infested countries across the world.
- The snail population spread rapidly in the State, spurred by two more waves of invasion in the 1970s and in 2005.

Giant African Snail (Achatina fulica)

- It is one of the worst invasive species declared by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN).
- It is suspected to spread eosinophilic meningitis, septicaemia and peritonitis in humans.

- *IUCN* category *LC* (*Least* concern)
- This snail prefers hot and humid tropical climates and is mainly found in swamps, agricultural areas and bushes.
- Like most snails, it can hibernate by digging itself into the ground and can stay in hibernation for up to 18 months.
- They are hermaphrodites though they still require another snail for fertilization and can't self-fertilize.

- Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has recently allowed Regional Rural Banks (RRBs) to access the Liquidity Adjustment Facility (LAF), Marginal Standing Facility (MSF) and call or notice money market, aimed at facilitating better liquidity management for these lenders.

- A dynamic consumption basket is considered the basis to obtain core inflation.

• Core inflation is calculated using the Consumer Price Index (CPI) by excluding such commodities.

- The UN Commission on Narcotic Drugs (CND)
 has decided to remove cannabis and cannabis
 resin from Schedule IV of 1961 Single
 Convention on Narcotic Drugs, which lists the
 most dangerous substances.

- Both cannabis and cannabis resin will continue to remain on Schedule I, which includes the least dangerous category of substances.

- The houbara bustard, which lives in arid climates, and there are two distinct species
- 1. North African Boubara

- IIT-Bombay, recently released its Urban Quality of Life Index.
- It has various categories of comparisons including water, power, electricity, literacy rate, gender parity, employment rate among others.
- The study found that Jaipur has the highest crime rate against women, Chennai has the lowest.
- The gap in literacy rate between men and women is the widest in Jaipur (13.2%) and lowest in Kolkata (5.4%).
- Literacy was the highest in Pune (91%) and, surprisingly, the lowest in Hyderabad (83%).
- According to the index, Chennai has shown the least gender discrimination and differences and safe city for women, where Patna has high gender discrimination.
- The unemployment rate for women is the highest in Patna at 346, it is more than four times the urban average of 73.

- The rocks, moss, and corals in the sea are favourable not just for fishing but also for fish seeding.
- Conch shell is used as an important ritual object in Hinduism, it is used as a ceremonial trumpet, as part of religious practices.

- With capacity building the major focus of NMSHE, India have set up Climate Change (CC) cells in 12 out of the 13 states and Union territories of Himalayan region and will soon have 13th state CC cell in Ladakh,

National Mission for Sustaining the Himalayan Ecosystem (NMSHE)

• It is one of the eight missions under the National Action Plan on Climate Change (NAPCC).

- Out of the 8 national missions which are part of the National Action Plan on Climate Change, NMSHE is the *only site-specific mission* that aims to take suitable measures for safeguarding the Indian Himalayan Region.
- NMSHE is a multi-pronged, cross-cutting mission across various sectors.
- It contributes to the sustainable development of the country by enhancing the understanding of climate change, its likely impacts and adaptation actions required for the Himalayasa region on which a significant proportion of India's population depends for sustenance.
- NMSHE seeks to facilitate formulation of appropriate policy measures and time-bound action programmes to sustain ecological resilience and ensure the continued provisions of key ecosystem services in the Himalayas.
- Recognizing the importance of scientific and technological inputs required for sustaining the fragile Himalayan Ecosystem, the *Ministry of Science and Technology* has been given the *nodal responsibility* of *coordinating this mission*.
- However, the mission involves valuable cooperation of Indian Himalayan States, the Planning Commission and the Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change to achieve its goals.

- Millets represent a collective term referring to a number of *small-seeded annual grasses* that are cultivated as *grain crops*, primarily on marginal lands in dry areas of temperate, subtropical and tropical regions.
- They are often termed nutri-cereals, and includes Sorghum, Pearl Millet, Ragi, Small Millet, Foxtail Millet, Proso Millet, Barnyard Millet, Kodo Millet and other millets.
- Millets are the cereal crops generally smallseeded and known for high nutritive value.
- They are regarded as a subsistence product and generally looked upon as a famine crop for the poor.
- The UN Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) has decided to observe 2023 as the International Year of Millets.
- Cash crops are simply plants that are grown or managed, harvested, and sold for cash rather than for sustenance.
- Pulses are the dried, edible seeds of plants in the legume family.
- The United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) recognizes 11 types of pulses: dry beans, dry broad beans, dry peas, chickpeas, cow peas, pigeon peas, lentils, Bambara beans, vetches, lupins and pulses nes.

- Other Similar Experiment International Thermonuclear Experimental Reactor (ITER) is a collaboration of 35 nations launched in 1985, it is located in France.
- ITER's cryostat is manufactured by India's L&T, Cryostat is a chamber that can maintain very low temperatures.

- It will be the closest alignment of Saturn and Jupiter since 1623, in terms of distance.
- The next time the planets will be this close is 2080.
- They will appear to be close together, however, they will be more than 400 million miles apart.

• This report highlights the discrepancy between countries' planned fossil fuel production levels and the global levels necessary to limit warming to 1.5°C or 2°C.

- To limit warming to 1.5°C or well below 2°C, as required by the 2015 Paris Agreement, the world needs to wind down fossil fuel production.
- Instead, governments continue to plan to produce coal, oil, and gas far in excess of the levels consistent with the Paris Agreement temperature limits.
- This gap is large, with countries aiming to produce 120% more fossil fuels by 2030 than would be consistent with limiting global warming to 1.5°C.
- The production gap report modelled after the UNEP's Emissions Gap Report series and conceived as a complementary analysis.

- A 'mystery disease' has left 450 patients in Eluru, Andhra Pradesh with seizures, nausea, dizziness and headaches.
- It is being investigated that organochlorines may be behind the unknown illness.

Organochlorines (OC)

- They are a group of chlorinated compounds that belong to the class of *Persistent Organic Pollutants (POPs)* with high persistence in the environment.
- They are widely used as pesticides.
- OC insecticides were earlier used to control malaria and typhus; they were later banned in most countries.
- They are relatively cheaper; as a result Dichlorodiphenyltrichloroethane (DDT), hexachlorocyclohexane (HCH), aldrin and dieldrin are among the most widely used pesticides in developing countries of Asia.
- A review statistics on the use of different pesticides has shown that 40 per cent of all pesticides used belong to the organochlorine class of chemicals.
- Organochlorine pesticides accumulate in the environment.
- They are persistent and move long distances in surface runoff or groundwater.
- OC can cause several adverse are substances capable of causing adverse effects in the



central and peripheral nervous system; as a result, several such chemicals were banned in the United States.

• OCs, in the mid-1970s in India, resulted in widespread reproductive failure among birds; they laid eggs with thin shells that cracked before hatching.

Climate Change Performance Index (CCPI)

- CCPI is published annually by Environment think tank Germanwatch since 2005.
- It is an independent monitoring tool for tracking countries' climate protection performance.
- It compares the climate protection performance of 57 countries and the European Union (EU), which are together responsible for more than 90% of global greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions.
- India, for the second time in a row ranked among the top 10, along with the EU and the UK. It scored 63.98 points out of 100.
- It received high ratings on all CCPI indicators except 'renewable energy', where it was categorised as having a 'medium' performance.
- The index found that no country was doing enough to meet the goals of the 2015 Paris Agreement.
- Six G20 countries were ranked among very low performers.
- The United States, with a rank of 61, was the worst performer.

- USA's National Academies of Sciences (NAS)
 has found directed microwave radiation to be

- The NAS report, examined four possibilities to explain the symptoms i.e. Infection, chemicals, psychological factors and microwave energy.
- The report concluded that directed pulsed RF energy appears to be the most plausible mechanism in explaining these cases among those that the committee considered.

Atmanirbhar Bharat RojgarYojana (ABRY)

- It aims to boost employment in *formal* sector and incentivize creation of new employment opportunities during the Covid recovery phase under Atmanirbhar Bharat Package 3.0.
- Cabinet has approved an expenditure of Rs.22,810 crore for the *entire Scheme period i.e.* 2020-2023.
- Under the scheme, Government of India will provide *subsidy for two years* in respect of new employees engaged on or after 1st October, 2020 and up to 30th June, 2021.
- Government of India will pay both 12% employees' contribution and 12% employers' contribution i.e. 24% of wages towards EPF in respect of new employees in establishments employing up to 1000 employees for two years and only 12% of wages in establishments employing more than 1000 employee for two years.
- EPFO will credit the contribution in Aadhaar seeded account of members in electronic manner.

• India and UN-Based Better Than Cash Alliance has recently organized a joint Peer learning exchange on **fintech solutions for responsible digital payments** at the last mile.

Better Than Cash Alliance

- It is a partnership of *governments*, *companies and international organizations* that accelerates the transition from cash to responsible digital payments to advance the Sustainable Development Goals.
- It is based at the United Nations.
- The Alliance has 75 members which are committed to digitizing payments and helps in building economies that are digital and inclusive.

- SC and OBC beneficiaries could avail an interest subvention of 5% p.a. on bank loans of up to Rs.4 lakh per SHG and Rs.2 lakh per individual.
- It aims to ensure more credit in the hands of the most-deprived households for productive and economic activities.
- With subvention of interest, banks too would be encouraged to lend to the disadvantaged sections.

• The scheme would help in immediate liquidity as it would entail direct beneficiary transfer mode of crediting the accounts of beneficiaries.

 Least Developed Countries Report 2020 was released by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD).

Least Developed Countries Report 2020

- It found that the Least Developed Countries (LDC) will put in their worst economic performance in three decades this year due to the pandemic.
- Between October 2019 and October 2020, the economic growth forecast for LDCs was revised sharply downwards from 5 to -0.4%.
- This revision was expected to lead to a 2.6% reduction in per capita income in LDCs in 2020.
- The number of people living in extreme poverty (earning less than Rs 150 per day), will increase by 32 million in 2020 because of COVID-19.
- Total remittances to low- and middle-income countries (LMICs) are also forecast to fall by one-fifth in 2020, with an even sharper contraction in South Asian and sub-Saharan African countries.
- This increase in poverty will roll back some of the progress made towards sustainable development and possibly lead to long-term damage.
- Progress on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG), especially Goal 1 ('No Poverty') as well as those related to health and education will stall.
- The report urged the international community to support LDCs with adequate financial resources.

Molnupiravir

- Recently researchers has shown that Molnupiravir can stop the transmission of SARS-CoV-2 in 24 hours.
- It is an antiviral drug also known as MK-4482/EIDD-2801.



- It is being developed by the biotechnology firm Ridgeback Biotherapeutics in collaboration with pharmaceutical firm Merck.
- It is the first demonstration of an orally available drug to rapidly block SARS-CoV-2 transmission.
- It is a pro-drug of the synthetic nucleoside derivative N4-hydroxycytidine, and exerts its antiviral action through introduction of copying errors during viral RNA replication.

Countries of Particular Concern

- Designation of the CPC is the top tier recommendation by the US Commission on International Religious Freedom (USCIRF) for violation of international religious freedom.
- This is in line with the International Religious Freedom Act of 1998 which was passed to promote religious freedom as a foreign policy of the United States.
- Pakistan and China along with Myanmar, Eritrea, Iran, Nigeria, North Korea, Saudi Arabia, Tajikistan and Turkmenistan were recently added to CPC for violation of religious freedom.
- Nigeria is the first secular democracy that has been named a CPC.
- It is followed by Special Watch List Countries that have engaged in or tolerated severe violations of religious freedom.
- The report placed Comoros, Cuba, Nicaragua and Russia on a Special Watch List.
- Notably, the State Department did not accept the USCIRF recommendation that India, Russia, Syria and Vietnam be also designated as CPCs.

• India Prime Minister Shri. Narendra Modi has recently paid his tributes to the people who sacrificed their lives in the **Assam** movement.

Assam Movement (1979-1985)

- It was a popular movement against illegal immigrants in Assam.
- The movement was led by All Assam Students Union (AASU) and the All Assam Gana Sangram Parishad (AAGSP).
- They developed a program of protests and demonstration to compel the Indian government to identify and expel illegal, (mostly Bangladeshisi), immigrants and protect and provide constitutional, legislative and administrative safeguards to the indigenous Assamese people.
- The agitation programs were largely nonviolent, but the Nellie massacre was a case of extreme violence.
- The agitation program **ended in August 1985** following the **Assam Accord**, which was signed by leaders of AASU-AAGSP and the Government of India.
- During the movement, it was reported that 855 (later on 860 as submitted by AASU) number of peoples sacrificed their lives in the hope of an "Infiltration Free Assam" in the 1979-1985 Assam agitation.

- Scientists have recently found that aerosols like black carbon and dust, which makes the Indo-Gangetic Plain one of the most polluted regions of the world, have led to increased incidents of high rainfall events in the foothills of the Himalayan Region.
- The study highlighted the crucial role of the *aerosol direct radiative effect* on high precipitation events over the Himalayan region.
- Aerosol is a colloidal dispersion of **solid or** *liquid particles in a gas*.
- (e.g) smoke or fog.

Indo-Gangetic Plain

- The Indo-Gangetic Plain is located South and upwind of the Himalayan foothills.
- The region is associated with high aerosol loading, much of which is black carbon and dust, and thus provides an opportunity for studying how aerosol affects extreme rainfall events, particularly when air mass is forced from a low elevation to a higher elevation as it moves over rising terrain technically called orographic forcing.

• A new species of Indian Muraingrasses known for their ecological and economic importance, such as fodder, have been spotted by scientists in Goa in the Western Ghats, one of the four global biodiversity hotspots of India.

Ischaemum Janarthanamii

- The species was named *Ischaemum Janarthanamii* in honour of Prof. M. K. Janarthanam, Professor of Botany, Goa University, for his contribution to the Indian grass taxonomy and documentation of the floristic diversity of Goa state.
- Ischaemum Janarthanamii grows on low altitude lateritic plateaus in the outskirts of Bhagwan Mahavir National Park, Goa.
- The vegetation is exposed to extreme climatic conditions like desiccation in drier months and soils with low nutrient availability.
- However, withstanding these, the species has adapted to survive harsh conditions and blossom every monsoon.
- Globally 85 species are known from Ischaemum, of which 61 species are exclusively found in India.
- The Western Ghats have 40 species with the highest concentration of the genus.

Quantum Key Distribution (QKD)

- Quantum cryptography is a technology that uses quantum physics to secure the distribution of symmetric encryption keys.
- Quantum key distribution utilizes the unique properties of quantum mechanical systems to generate and distribute cryptographic keying material using special purpose technology.

- The technology is developed by CAIR, Bengaluru and DYSL-QT, Mumbai.
- Defence Research & Development Organisation (DRDO) undertook the project for development of Quantum Key Distribution (QKD).
- The work being done at DRDO will be used to enable start-ups and SMEs in the domain of Quantum information technologies.

Northern Lights

- Northern Lights, also known as aurora borealis, are usually witnessed far up in the Polar Regions or the high latitude regions of Europe, like in Norway.
- Auroras occur when charged particles ejected from the Sun's surface called the solar wind enter the Earth's atmosphere.
- At the north and south poles, the charged particles interact with different gases in the atmosphere, causing a display of light in the sky.
- This display, known as an aurora, is seen from the Earth's high latitude regions (called the auroral oval), and is active all year round.
- In the northern part of our globe, the polar lights are called aurora borealis or Northern Lights, and are seen from the US (Alaska), Canada, Iceland, Greenland, Norway, Sweden and Finland.
- In the south, they are called aurora australis or southern lights, and are visible from high latitudes in Antarctica, Chile, Argentina, New Zealand and Australia.

- **Beresheet** It was Israel's first lunar mission and the first attempt by a private company to land on the Moon.
- It is a collaborative effort of Israeli non-profit SpaceIL, Israel Aerospace Industries and the Israeli Space Agency.
- The Beresheet-2 mission is scheduled to be launched in 2024.



- **Kaguya** is a Japanese Space Agency (JAXA) lunar orbiter mission.
- The primary objective of the mission is a global survey of the Moon, obtaining data on elemental abundance, mineralogical composition.

- If it is not done within this time, the investigating officer will have to explain the reasons in a written report to the commissioner of police or special inspector general.

District Development Council (DDC)

- In October, 2020, J&K adapted the J&K Panchayati Raj Act, 1989.
- Now every district in J&K will have a District Development Council (DDC) having jurisdiction over the entire district, excluding municipal areas.
- Every DDC will have 14 directly-elected members.
- The 20 districts of J&K would have 280 directly-elected members.
- Every DDC shall comprise directly-elected members, the chairpersons of all Block Development Councils and members of the legislative assembly from the district.
- With the adaptation of 73rd constitutional amendment to J&K that led to the formation of DDCs, the government has paved way for the establishment of all three tiers of Panchayati Raj Institutions— Panchayat, Block Development Council and DDC.
- The DDC will be responsible for the formulation of development programmes of the area under its authority.
- Five standing committees, one each for finance, development, public works, health and education, and welfare will now be constituted in every DDC.
- The DDC replaced the District Development Board of the erstwhile state of J&K, in which a cabinet minister or a minister of state would chair DDBs, and members included MLAs, MLCs and MPs.
- In DDBs, the planning and execution of development works was mostly done by the district development commissioners, which would not be done by the elected representatives.

 Droughts in India have historically been associated with El Nino, an anomalous warming of the equatorial Pacific, but



- scientists from IISc Bengaluru has recently suggest that not all Indian droughts are caused by El Nino.
- The study that appears in journal Science says that nearly six out of 10 droughts, in non-El Nino years, that occurred during the Indian summer-monsoon season in the past century may have been driven by atmospheric disturbances from the North Atlantic region.

Rossby waves

- It is also known as planetary waves.
- They naturally occur in rotating fluids.
- Within the Earth's ocean and atmosphere, these waves form as a result of the rotation of the planet.
- These waves play a significant role in shaping the planet's weather and climate.

Atmospheric Rossby Waves

- Atmospheric Rossby waves form primarily as a result of the Earth's geography.
- Rossby waves help transfer heat from the tropics toward the poles and cold air toward the tropics in an attempt to return atmosphere to balance.
- They also help locate the jet stream and mark out the track of surface low pressure systems.
- The slow motion of these waves often results in fairly long, persistent weather patterns.

Oceanic Rossby Waves

- Waves in the ocean come in many different shapes and sizes.
- Slow-moving oceanic Rossby waves are fundamentally different from ocean surface waves.
- Unlike waves that break along the shore, Rossby waves are huge, undulating movements of the ocean that stretch horizontally across the planet for hundreds of kilometers in a westward direction.
- They are so large and massive that they can change Earth's climate conditions.

 Ramanujan Prize for Young Mathematicians, 2020 was awarded to Dr. Carolina Araujo.

- Mathematician from the Institute for Pure and Applied Mathematics (IMPA), Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in a virtual ceremony recently.
- The prize awarded by the Department of Science and Technology of the Government of India in collaboration with ICTP (International Centre for Theoretical Physics), and the International Mathematical Union was given for her outstanding work in algebraic geometry.
- Dr. Araujo, who is Vice President of the Committee for Women in Mathematics at the International Mathematical Union, is the first non-Indian women mathematician to receive this prize and will be a role model for all women around the world.

Ramanujan Prize for Young Mathematicians

- The award has been awarded *annually since* **2005**.
- It was originally instituted by ICTP, the *Niels Henrik Abel Memorial Fund*, and the International Mathematical Union (IMU).
- The participation of the Abel Fund ended in 2012.
- The Department of Science and Technology of the Government of India (DST) is funding the Prize, starting with the 2014 Prize.
- The Prize is awarded annually to a researcher from a developing country who is less than 45 years of age on 31 December of the year of the award, and who has conducted outstanding research in a developing country.
- Researchers working in any branch of the mathematical sciences are eligible.
- The Prize carries a \$15,000 cash award.
- The Prize is usually awarded to one person, but may be shared equally among recipients who have contributed to the same body of work.
- The award is given in the memory of Srinivasa Ramanujan, a genius in pure mathematics who was essentially self-taught and made spectacular contributions to elliptic functions, continued fractions, infinite series, and analytical theory of numbers.

- The term real-time gross settlement (RTGS) refers to a funds transfer system that allows for the instantaneous transfer of money and/or securities.
- RGTS is the continuous process of settling payments on an individual order basis without netting debits with credits across the books of a central bank.
- Once completed, real-time gross settlement payments are final and irrevocable.
- The available hours for RTGS transactions vary based on the individual banks and their branches, the standard timing ranges in between 7:00 a.m. to 7:45 p.m.
- Recently RBI permitted the round the clock availability of RTGS for extended flexibility to businesses for effecting payments.
- However there are no changes made to transaction limits it is capped at minimum limit of Rs. 2 lakhs for RTGS transactions, and there's no maximum limit as such.

Global Health Estimates

- The WHO Global Health Estimates provide a comprehensive and comparable assessment of mortality and loss of health due to diseases and injuries for all regions of the world.
- The new data of Global Health Estimates cover the period from 2000 to 2019.
- Highlights of the recent report are
- Top Ten Causes of Death: Ischaemic heart disease, Stroke, Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, Lower respiratory infections, Neonatal conditions, Trachea, bronchus and lung cancers, Alzheimer disease

- and other dementias, Diarrhoeal diseases, Diabetes mellitus, Kidney diseases.
- 2. Non-communicable diseases: Make up 7 of the world's top 10 causes of death, an increase from 4 of the 10 leading causes in 2000.
- 3. In the Eastern Mediterranean, deaths from diabetes have more than doubled and represent the greatest percentage increase of all WHO regions.
- 4. Communicable diseases: They still take in low-income countries: 6 of the top 10 causes of death in low-income countries are still communicable diseases, including malaria (6th), tuberculosis (8th) and Acquired Immuno Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) (9th).

Background

- In the *Union Budget 2020*, Union Minister of Finance Corporate Affairs Smt. Nirmala Sitharaman had made an announcement for setting up an International Bullion Exchange at the International Financial Services Centre in *GIFT City, Gandhinagar, Gujarat*.
- IFSCA has been entrusted with the responsibility of operationalization of this Exchange.
- In this regard, International Financial Services Centres Authority (Bullion Exchange) Regulations 2020 were recently approved by the Authority in its meeting held on October 27,2020.

Bullion

 According to the regulation, bullion means precious metals, including gold, silver or any other precious metal in **the form of bars** or unallocated gold, silver, or such other precious metals, as the Authority may consider relevant in this regard.

• Myristica Swamp Tree Frog has been recorded for the first time north of the Shencottah gap in the Vazhachal Reserve Forest in Kerala's Thrissur district.

Myristica Swamp Tree Frog

- It is a rare arboreal species endemic to the Western Ghats.
- These frogs are rare and elusive for the reason that they are arboreal and active only for a few weeks during their breeding season.



- During this season, there is a large aggregation of males that descend from the high canopy of the trees.
- The breeding season, unlike for other frogs, starts in the pre-monsoon season (May) and ends before the monsoon becomes fully active in June.
- Before the end of the breeding season, the female frogs along with their male counterparts descend on the forest floor.
- The female digs the mud and lays eggs in shallow burrows in mud. After breeding and egg-laying, they retreat back to the high canopies of the tree and remain elusive till next breeding season.

- It is the first of the three Project 17A ships being built at Garden Reach Shipbuilders and Engineers Limited (GRSE), Kolkata.
- She made her first contact with the waters of Hoogly River recently.

Project 17 A

- Under the Project 17A program, a total of seven ships, four at Mazagon Dock Shipbuilders Limited (MDL) and three ships at GRSE are being built with enhanced stealth features, advanced indigenous weapon and sensor fit along with several other improvements.
- P17A ships are the first gas turbine propulsion and largest combat platforms ever built at GRSE.
- Since its inception, Project 17A has upheld India's vision for Atmanirbhar Bharat.

• The Maharashtra Cabinet has recently approved the introduction of two draft bills pertaining to the prevention of incidents of violence and atrocities against women and children in the state.

Maharashtra Shakti Criminal Law (Maharashtra Amendment) Act, 2020

- The bill intended to curb crimes against women.
- The Shakti act is modelled on the lines of Andhra Pradesh's Disha act, which was brought last year.
- Stringent punishment, including the death penalty and heavy fines on the perpetrators is a key feature of the draft bill.
- The perpetrators will be punished with imprisonment for life for not less than ten years but may extend to the remainder of natural life or with death.
- The bill also proposes setting up of a "Women and Children Offenders Registry" linked to the National Registry of Sexual Offenders with details of persons convicted of specified offences of sexual violence against women and children.

- The disclosure has to be done online through MoEFCC's *Parivesh portal*.
- In its current form, the amnesty scheme is *just an advisory*, not a law.

- Meteors are best visible on a cloudless night and when the Moon is not extremely bright.
- When a meteor reaches the Earth, it is called a meteorite and a series of meteorites, when encountered at once, is termed a meteor shower.
- The Geminids meteor showers are unique because their origin does not lie in a comet, but what is believed to be an asteroid or an extinct comet.
- The Geminids emerge from 3200 Phaethon, which meteor scientists consider to be an asteroid.
- Geminids travel at a speed of 78,000 mph or 35 km/s, which is over 1000 times faster than a cheetah.

- The Himalayan serow is a subspecies of the mainland serow (Capricornis sumatraensis).
- It has been recently sighted for the first time in the Himalayan cold desert region in Spiti, Himachal Pradesh.
- It's a medium-sized mammal with a large head, thick neck, short limbs, long, mule-like ears, and a coat of dark hair.
- There are several species of serows, and all of them are found in Asia.
- They are known to be found in eastern, central, and western Himalayas, but not in the Trans Himalayan region.



• It is now been categorised as 'vulnerable' in the IUCN Red List of Threatened Species.

Apple Scab Disease

- The apple scab generally did not kill trees, but can cause defoliation, that weakens the tree and influences its survival during winter conditions.
- It observed that early infections could lead to abnormal growth (fruit deformation) and fruit drop.
- If the fruit is infected late in the summer or just before harvest, black, circular, minimal (0.1-4 mm diameter) lesions called 'pin-point scab' would appear during storage.
- The disease can be minimised / prevented through good horticultural practices such as
- 1. Selecting sites that provide more than six hours of sunlight a day.
- 2. Spacing trees adequately following proper pruning practices to open the tree canopy.
- 3. Sanitising in orchards to prevent pseudothecial formation in overwintering apple leaves.

Food Hygiene Rating Scheme

- Hygiene rating is a *voluntary scheme* applicable to food businesses supplying food directly to consumers either on or off the premises and food businesses are rated on the basis of food hygiene and safety conditions found at the time of inspection.
- It is an initiative of Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI).
- The food establishments are rated based on food hygiene and safety conditions observed at the time of audit.
- The hygiene rating will be *in the form of smileys (1 up to 5)* and the certificate should be displayed prominently in the consumer facing area.
- The recognized Hygiene Rating Audit Agencies will be responsible for verifying the compliance with food hygiene and safety procedures laid by FSSAI and get Hygiene Rating.
- It was launched with an intent of ensuring that consumer make informed choices while eating out and also encouraging food businesses to showcase and improve their food hygiene standards.
- This scheme is being implemented in:
- 1. Bakeries
- 2. Sweet Shops
- 3. Meat Retail Shops
- 4. Food Service Establishments such as restaurants, cafeteria, dhabahs, etc.

GRIHA Summit

- It is the annual flagship event organized by GRIHA Council in association with key stakeholders in construction industry to discuss and deliberate on furtherance of Sustainable Habitat Development in India.
- The first conference, held in January 2010, had 400 participants representing all the key stakeholders in the construction industry.

• Union Minister for Finance & Corporate Affairs Smt. Nirmala Sitharaman has recently chaired the 23rd Meeting of the Financial Stability and Development Council (FSDC) through video conference.

Highlights of the meeting

- The meeting reviewed the major macroeconomic developments and Financial Stability issues (global and domestic) with special reference to vulnerability related issues.
- The Council also discussed the budget proposals submitted by RBI and other Regulators.
- The Council discussed the challenges involved in smooth transition of London Interbank Offer Rate (LIBOR) based contracts and noted that a multipronged strategy involving relevant stakeholder institutions and departments is required in this regard.
- The Council also took note of the activities undertaken by the FSDC Sub-Committee chaired by the Governor of RBI and the action taken by members on FSDC decisions earlier.

Financial Stability and Development Council (FSDC)

• In pursuance of the announcement made in the *Union Budget 2010–11* and with a view to strengthen and institutionalize the mechanism for maintaining financial stability and enhancing inter-regulatory coordination, Indian Government has setup an apex-level Financial Stability and Development Council (FSDC) *in 2010*.



- FSDC has replaced the High Level Coordination Committee on Financial Markets (HLCCFM), which was facilitating regulatory coordination, though informally, prior to the setting up of FSDC.
- The Chairman of the FSDC is the Finance Minister of India and its members include the heads of the financial sector regulatory authorities (i.e, SEBI, IRDA, RBI, PFRDA and FMC), Finance Secretary and/or Secretary, Department of Economic Affairs, Secretary, Department of Financial Services and the Chief Economic Adviser.
- A **sub-committee of FSDC** has also been set up under the chairmanship of **Governor RBI**.
- The Sub-Committee discusses and decides on a range of issues relating to financial sector development and stability including substantive issues relating to inter-regulatory coordination.

Cabomba Furcata

- Cabomba is a submerged perennial aquatic plant that grows in stagnant to slow-flowing freshwater.
- It dominantly belongs to Central and South America.
- The plant will spread in the water bodies across, choking them as well as the drainage canals.
- It requires a huge amount of oxygen to grow and that could badly affect freshwater biodiversity.
- The plant has a high natural dispersal potential due to its ability to readily fragment and spread.
- Recently the plant has caused the 'pink phenomenon' in Kerala by covering the water bodies.

IUCN Red Data Book

 The Red Data Book is a public document which is created for recording endangered and rare species of plants, animals, fungi as well as

- some local subspecies which are present in a particular region.
- This book is mainly created to identify and protect those species which are on the verge of extinction.
- IUCN is initiating the Red List Assessment of grasshoppers in India for the first time by the end of this year.
- The assessment will include Tettilobus trishula, a new species of grasshopper discovered recently in the Eravikulam National Park in Kerala's Idukki district.
- So far, none of the Indian grasshopper species have been listed in the Red Data Book.
- Red List assessment of endemic grasshoppers of NBR would update their conservation status and kick off India's grasshopper conservation activities.

Cold Day

- A cold day is when the maximum temperature dips 4.5 degrees Celsius below normal temperature which has been set based on climatological data of 30 years between 1981 and 2010.
- In winters, whenever an active Western Disturbance passes through the western Himalayan region, it leads to a dip in temperatures across northwest India.
- North-westerly winds blowing over Delhi from the direction of this high altitude area, and clearing of cloud cover with the passing of Western Disturbance, and leads to a fall in temperatures.
- The lack of cloud cover also leads to higher radiation from the Earth's surface into the atmosphere at night time, which also cools the ground, Srivastava said.
- Under the influence of an active La Niña climate pattern, temperatures across the globe have been dipping.

Himalayan Griffon

• The Himalayan vulture (Gyps himalayensis) or Himalayan griffon vulture is an Old World



- vulture native to the Himalayas and the adjoining Tibetan Plateau.
- They live mainly in the higher regions of the Himalayas, the Pamirs, Kazakhstan and on the Tibetan Plateau.
- Recently, Himalayan griffon vulture has been sighted for the first time at the Point Calimere Wildlife and Bird Sanctuary near Vedaranyam.

Biomass Co-Firing

- Biomass co-firing stands for adding biomass as a partial substitute fuel in high efficiency coal boilers.
- Coal and biomass are combusted together in boilers that have been designed to burn coal.

- Co-firing is an option to convert biomass to electricity, in an efficient and clean way, and to reduce GHG emissions of the power plant.
- Biomass co-firing is a globally accepted costeffective method for decarbonising a coal fleet.
- Decarbonising means reducing carbon intensity, i.e. reducing the emissions per unit of electricity generated (often given in grams of carbon dioxide per kilowatt-hour).

Prime Minister's Special Scholarship Scheme (PMSSS)

- An Expert Group was constituted by the Prime Minister for enhancing *employment opportunity among youths of J&K and Ladakh* and formulate job opportunities in public and private sectors.
- Subsequently, Prime Minister's Special Scholarship Scheme (PMSSS) is being implemented by the All India Council for Technical Education(AICTE), New Delhi.
- The Scheme aims to build the capacities of the youths of J&K and Ladakh by Educating, Enabling and Empowering them to compete in the normal course.
- Under the Scheme, the youths of J&K and Ladakh are supported by way of scholarship in two parts namely the academic fee & maintenance allowance.
- The academic fee is paid to the institution where the student is provided admission after on-line counselling process conducted by the AICTE.
- The academic fee covers tuition fee and other components as per the ceiling fixed for various professional, medical and other undergraduate courses.
- In order to meet expenditure towards hostel accommodation, mess expenses, books & stationery etc., a fixed amount of Rs.1.00 Lakh is provided to the beneficiary and is paid in instalments @ Rs. 10,000/- per month directly into students account.



• A committee constituted by the Union Ministry of Education (MoE) to suggest measures for effective implementation of reservation policies in IITs has recommended that these institutions be exempted from following the policies in faculty recruitment.

Committee

- The Committee was constituted in April 2020 with Director of IIT Delhi, *V. Ramgopal Rao*, as its *Chairperson* and the Director of IIT Kanpur, Registrars of IIT Bombay and IIT Madras, and representatives from Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment (MoSJE), Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Department of Personnel and Training and Department of Persons with Disabilities as members.
- It was asked to suggest measures on effective implementation of reservation policies not only in recruitment, but also for admissions.
- The committee met twice in May and submitted its report on June 17, 2020.

Highlights of the report

- The committee suggested that IITs be included in the list of *Institutes of Excellence (IoE)* that are exempted from reservation policies under the Central Educational Institutions (Reservation in Teachers' Cadre) Act (CEI Act) of 2019.
- The committee based its recommendations primarily on arguments claiming the *need for IITs to maintain their academic excellence* and the lack of candidates from the reserved categories who fulfil the qualification criteria.
- Currently, eight institutions, including the Homi Bhabha National Institute and its constituent units, Tata Institute of Fundamental Research, Space Physics Laboratory and Indian Institute of Remote Sensing are on the list.

• The United States has recently imposed sanctions on **Turkey** over Ankara's acquisition of Russian S-400 air defence systems.

- Ankara acquired the Russian S-400 ground-toair defenses in mid-2019 and says they pose no threat to NATO allies.
- Washington has long been threatening sanctions on Turkey and had removed the country from an F-35 jet program last year.
- India got a waiver from buying the Russian S-400 air defence systems from the outgoing Trump administration.

S-400 Air Defence Missile System

- The S-400 Triumf, (NATO calls it SA-21 Growler), is a mobile, surface-to-air missile system (SAM) designed by Russia.
- It is the most dangerous operationally deployed modern long-range SAM (MLR SAM) in the world, considered much ahead of the US-developed Terminal High Altitude Area Defense system (THAAD).

Countering America's Adversaries through Sanctions Act (CAATSA)

- It was passed unanimously by the US Congress and signed reluctantly by US President Donald Trump.
- Enacted on August 2, 2017, its core objective is to counter Iran, Russia and North Korea through punitive measures.
- Section 231 of the Act empowers the US
 President to impose at least five of the 12 listed
 sanctions enumerated in Section 235 of the
 Act on persons engaged in a "significant
 transaction" with Russian defence and
 intelligence sectors.

- It was formerly and still commonly known in English as Swaziland.

Communication Satellites of India

- **CMS-01** ISRO is gearing up for the launch of India's communication satellite CMS-01 using the rocket PSLV-C50.
- India's new communication satellite CMS-01 will be positioned into the geosynchronous transfer orbit.
- Generally, communication satellites are heavier and therefore the PSLV rocket carrying it requires an extra thrust to take them to the geo-synchronous transfer orbit.
- The satellite CMS-01 will have transponders that will be useful in covering mainland India and also far-flung island territories of Andaman and Nicobar and the Lakshadweep for communication purposes.
- **GSAT** The GSAT (Geostationary Satellite) satellites are India's indigenously developed communications satellites, used for digital audio, data and video broadcasting.
- As of now 20 GSAT satellites of ISRO have been launched out of which 14 satellites are in service.

- INSAT The Indian National Satellite (INSAT) system is one of the largest domestic communication satellite systems in Asia-Pacific region with nine operational communication satellites placed in Geostationary orbit.
- The INSAT system with more than 200 transponders, it provides services to telecommunications, television broadcasting, satellite newsgathering, societal applications, weather forecasting, disaster warning and Search and Rescue operations.

Plasmodium Ovale Malaria

- Plasmodium Ovale Malaria is endemic to tropical Western Africa, and a not very common type of malaria found across the world.
- It is relatively unusual outside of Africa and, where found, comprises less than 1% of the isolates.
- P ovale rarely causes severe illness and there is no need for panic, it is very similar to P vivax, which is not a killer form.
- Symptoms include fever for 48 hours, headache and nausea, thus P ovale is no more dangerous than getting a viral infection.
- There are five kinds of malarial parasites
- 1. Plasmodium falciparum,
- 2. Plasmodium vivax (the commonest ones),
- 3. Plasmodium malariae,
- 4. Plasmodium ovale
- 5. Plasmodium knowlesi.

Asset Quality Review

- Under AQR, a small sample of loans is inspected to check if asset classification was in line with the loan repayment and if banks have made provisions adequately.
- AQR was introduced in 2015, when RBI believed that asset classification was not being done properly and it tried to avoid banks which were postponing bad-loan classification.



- The AQR created widespread destruction on banks' profit & loss accounts.
- After introduction of the asset quality review (AQR) since 2015, many hidden bad loans had surfaced, forcing the government to enact the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (IBC) for resolution of bad loans.

- Oceanus Procellarum or, the "Ocean of Storms" is a vast lunar mare on the western edge of the near side of the Moon.
- It is the only one of the lunar maria to be called an "Oceanus" (ocean), due to its size.
- The region is near a site called the Mons Rumker that was believed to have been volcanic in ancient times.
- It stretches more than 2,500 km (1,600 mi) across its north-south axis and covering

- roughly 4,000,000 km2 accounting for 10.5% of the total lunar surface area.
- Recently China's Chang'e 5 lunar mission collected around 2 kilograms of lunar samples from this area.
- These lunar samples could help to understand the moon's volcanic activity and evolution.
- This the first fresh rock samples from this region of the moon.
- These are also the first samples to be collected by any country after Russia in 1976.
- With this, China became the third country after the United States and the Soviet Union, to collect lunar samples.

Khudiram Bose

- He was born in 1889 at a small village in Midnapore district, he was inspired by a series of public lectures given by Sri Aurobindo and sister Nivedita in the early 1900s.
- In 1905, when Bengal was partitioned, he actively participated in protests against the British.
- At the age of 15, Bose joined the Anushilan Samiti, an early 20th century organisation that propounded revolutionary activities in Bengal.
- On April 30, 1908, Bose threw a bomb on a carriage which he suspected was carrying district magistrate of Muzaffarpur, Douglas Kingsford.
- But it turned out that it was carrying the wife and daughter of a barrister named Pringle Kennedy, who lost their lives, as Kingsford escaped.
- Following this incident, after a judicial trail Khudiram Bose was executed.

- Shigella is a Gram-negative, non-motile bacillus belonging to the Enterobacteriaceae family, it causes an infection called shigellosis.
- The infected will have diarrhoea, stomach cramps and fever.
- Diarrhoea, often containing blood or mucus in stool, stomach pain, cramps, fever and vomiting are the main symptoms of the infection.
- Infants, non-breast fed children, children recovering from measles, malnourished children, and adults older than 50 years have a more severe illness and a greater risk of death.
- It is highly contagious and can be transmitted after using a common toilet also.
- The transmission occurs via the faecal-oral route, person-to-person contact, household flies, infected water, and inanimate objects.
- Pivmecillinam and Ceftriaxone were the only antimicrobials that are usually effective for treatment of multi-resistant strains of Shigella in all age groups.

Positive Pay System

- Recently, the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has announced that it will introduce the 'Positive Pay System' for cheques transactions above Rs 50,000 in a bid to enhance safety and eliminate frauds.
- Under this process, the issuer of the cheque submits electronically (through channels like SMS, mobile app, Internet banking and ATM) certain minimum details of that cheque to the drawee bank, details of which are cross-checked with the presented cheque by Cheque Truncation System (CTS).
- The National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI) will develop the facility of Positive Pay in CTS, and make it available to participant banks.
- The Positive Pay System will be implemented from January 1, 2021.
- While availing of this facility is at the discretion of the account holder, banks may consider making it mandatory in case of

cheques for amounts of Rs 5,00,000 and above.

Angiotensin Converting Enzyme 2 (ACE2)

- An enzyme called ACE alters a chemical, Angiotensin I, and converts it into Angiotensin II, which causes blood vessels to constrict.
- The tightening of the blood vessels leads to an increase in blood pressure.
- The ACE2 molecule comes in to counteract the effects of ACE, causing blood vessels to dilate and lowering blood pressure.
- The spikes that make up the 'crown' of coronavirus bind to ACE2 enzymes to get into our cells.
- These spikes on the surface of virus are called S1 proteins, and they are what binds to the ACE2 molecule on our cells.
- The virus is then able to invade the cell by a process called endocytosis, where the cell membrane engulfs the virus and internalises it within a bubble called an endosome.
- SARS-CoV-2, the virus behind COVID-19, has a high binding capacity for ACE2 between 10 and 20 times more that of the original SARS virus.
- Men have higher levels of the angiotensinconverting enzyme 2 (ACE2), which is a protein in the blood that Sars-CoV2, the virus that causes Covid-19, uses to enter human cells.

Great Indian Bustard (GIB)



- The GIB is one of the most critically threatened species in India, with fewer than 150 birds left in the wild.
- Power lines, especially high-voltage transmission lines with multiple overhead wires, are the most important current threat for GIBs in the Thar region, and are causing unsustainably high mortality in about 15% of their population.

Firefly bird diverters

- They are flaps installed on power lines.
- They work as reflectors for bird species like the GIB.
- Birds can spot them from a distance of about 50 metres and change their path of flight to avoid collision with power lines.
- The diverters are called fireflies because they look like fireflies from a distance, shining on power lines in the night.
- The selected stretch is opposite the Pokhran Field Firing Range, which offers a safe habitat to a breeding population of GIBs outside the Desert National Park Sanctuary in Jaisalmer.

- HelpAge India, an NGO that works for the care of elderly disadvantaged persons and senior citizens, recently received the UN Population Award, a first for an institution in India.

 The Committee for the United Nations Population Award is comprised of 10 UN Member States, with United Nations Secretary-General and UNFPA Executive Director serving as ex-officio members.

• India has recently added Tso Kar Wetland Complex in Ladakh as its 42nd Ramsar site, which is a second one in the Union Territory (UT) of Ladakh.

Tso Kar Basin

- It is a high-altitude wetland complex, consisting of two principal water bodies, **Startsapuk Tso**, a **freshwater lake and Tso Kar itself**, a **hypersaline lake**, situated in the Changthang region of Ladakh, India.
- It is called Tso Kar, meaning white lake, because of the white salt efflorescence found on the margins due to the evaporation of highly saline water.
- The Tso Kar Basin is an A1 Category Important Bird Area (IBA) as per Bird Life International and a key staging site in the *Central Asian Flyway*.
- The site is also one of the most important breeding areas of the Black-necked Crane (Grus nigricollis) in India.
- This IBA is also the major breeding area for
- 1. Great Crested Grebe (Podicepscristatus)
- 2. Bar-headed Geese (Anserindicus)
- 3. Ruddy Shelduck (Tadornaferruginea)
- 4. Brown-headed Gull (Larusbrunnicephalus)
- 5. Lesser Sand-Plover (Charadriusmongolus) and many other species.



Ramsar Convention

- The 'Convention on Wetlands' called the Ramsar Convention, signed in Ramsar, Iran, in 1971, is an intergovernmental treaty which provides the framework for national action and international cooperation for the conservation and wise use of wetlands and their resources.
- India became a party to Ramsar Convention in 1982 and so far, 41 wetlands have been designated as Ramsar sites.
- With the inclusion of Tso Kar wetland complex, India's number increased to 42 as of now.
- The aim of the Ramsar list is to develop and maintain an international network of wetlands which are important for the conservation of global biological diversity and for sustaining human life through the maintenance of their ecosystem components, processes and benefits.

Wetlands

- They provide a wide range of important resources and ecosystem services such as food, water, fibre, groundwater recharge, water purification, flood moderation, erosion control and climate regulation.
- They are, in fact a major source of water and our main supply of freshwater comes from an array of wetlands which help soak rainfall and recharge groundwater.

Ayushman Bharat PM-JAY SEHAT

- The scheme will ensure Universal Health Coverage and focus on providing financial risk protection and ensuring quality and affordable essential health services to all individuals and communities.
- The Scheme provides free of cost insurance cover to all the residents of Jammu and Kashmir.
- It provides financial cover up to five lakh rupees per family on a floater basis to all residents.

- The benefits of the scheme will be portable across the country.

Ayushman Bharat

- Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (PM-JAY) was launched by Prime Minister in 2018.
- The program with its two pillars Health and Wellness Centres and Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojna (PM JAY) – is envisaged to achieve UHC.
- It provides a cover of up to Rs 5 lakh per family per year, for secondary and tertiary care hospitalization for over 10.74 crore vulnerable families (approximately 50 crore beneficiaries), in a cashless and paperless manner, at public and empanelled private hospitals.

- A deadly brain-consuming amoeba Naegleria fowleri — is widely spreading from the southern states of United States of America (USA) towards the northern states.
- According to a report by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the geographic range of these cases has been advancing northward.

Naegleria fowleri

- It is a free-living microscopic amoeba.
- It can cause a rare and devastating infection of the brain called primary amebic meningoencephalitis (PAM).
- The amoeba is commonly found in warm freshwater and soil.
- Naegleria fowleri usually infects people when contaminated water enters the body through the nose.



- Once the amoeba enters the nose, it travels to the brain, where it causes PAM, which is usually fatal.
- Infection typically occurs when people go swimming or diving in warm freshwater places, like lakes and rivers.
- In very rare instances, Naegleria infections may also occur due to contaminated water from other sources.

- NBCFDC and Apollo Medskills signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) recently for deliverance of Vaccine Administration Training to Nurses, Pharmacists belonging to the Other Backward Classes Communities and Economically Backward Classes persons using the cofunding of NBCFDC.
- Over the next few months a few thousand persons are expected to be trained under this agreement to play a critical role as India proposes to vaccinate crores of its populations for protection against COVID-19.

National Backward Classes Finance & Development Corporation (NBCFDC)

- It is a Govt. of India Undertaking under the aegis of Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment.
- NBCFDC was incorporated under Section 25 of the Companies Act 1956 in 1992 (now section 8 of Companies Act 2013) as a Company not for profit.
- It was incorporated with an objective to promote economic and developmental activities for the benefit of Other Backward Classes (OBCs) and to assist the poorer section of these classes in skill development and selfemployment ventures.
- NBCFDC provides financial assistance through State Channelizing Agencies (SCAs) nominated by the State Governments/UTs and Banks (RRBs & PSBs).
- NBCFDC also provides Micro Financing through SCAs/ Self Help Groups (SHGs).
- It additionally facilitates skill development of poor persons belonging to OBCs, persons of

Economically Backward Classes (EBCs), **Denotified Nomadic and Semi-Nomadic Tribe, Sr. Citizen, Beggars and Transgender**.

5. d

- In the absence of any authentic data base regarding the location of insanitary latrines, it has been decided to seek the help of NGOs, Social Organisations and general public for collection and compilation of the data.
- For this purpose, Union Minister for Social Justice and Empowerment Shri Thaawarchand Gehlot launched a Mobile Application "Swachhata Abhiyan" in New Delhi recentlu.

Swachhata Abhiyan App

- The app has been developed to identify and geotag the data of insanitary latrines and manual scavengers so that the insanitary latrines can be replaced with sanitary latrines and rehabilitate all the manual scavengers to provide dignity of life to them.
- He urged all citizens of the country to download the above application and if they notice any insanitary latrine or manual scavenger, their details may be uploaded using the application.

Background

- Traditionally persons of a section of the society has been engaged or employed to clean undecomposed excreta from the dry latrines and latrines from which excreta is flushed into open drains.
- Such workers are called manual scavengers.
- Existence of the above mentioned type of insanitary latrines has been the main reason for manual scavenging.
- The Census 2011 reported the existence of more than 26 Lakh insanitary latrines in the country.
- Existence of insanitary latrines is the main reason for manual scavenging.
- Construction/ maintenance of insanitary latrines and engagement of persons for manual scavenging is prohibited under "**Prohibition**"



of Employment as Manual Scavengers and their Rehabilitation Act, 2013".

- This Act also mandates the local authorities to ensure survey of insanitary latrines, their demolition and construction of sanitary latrines in their place.
- Most of the insanitary latrines have been converted into sanitary latrines under the Swachh Bharat Mission implemented by the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs and the Department of drinking water and Sanitation in urban and rural areas respectively.
- The country has been declared open defecation free.

Antimatter

- The matter is made up of atoms, which are the basic units of chemical elements such as hydrogen, helium or oxygen.
- The sub-atomic particles of antimatter have properties opposite those of normal matter.
- The electrical charge of those particles is reversed.
- Antimatter was created along with matter after the Big Bang, but antimatter is rare in today's universe.
- Scientists believe that in the very hot and dense state shortly after the Big Bang, there must have been processes that gave preference to matter over antimatter.
- This created a small surplus of matter, and as the universe cooled, all the antimatter was destroyed, or annihilated, by an equal amount of matter, leaving a tiny surplus of matter.

Whale Songs

- Whales use songs to communicate and socialise, songs can be characterised as clicks, whistles and pulsed calls or a composition of "moans, snores, chirps and cries".
- Only some whales such as the baleen whale, have been found to sing songs.
- Whales use clicks to navigate and identify their surroundings as the sound bounces off objects, helping whales determine their shapes.

- Whale songs are typically below 4 kHz in frequency (human hearing range is between 20 Hz to 20 kHz).
- Some blue and fin whale songs are so low in their frequency that parts may be inaudible to human ears.

Industrial Ammonia

- A tri-hydroid of nitrogen (NH3), ammonia is a building block for ammonium nitrate (NH4NO3) that is used in agriculture as a high-nitrogen fertiliser.
- Ammonia, which is highly soluble in water, is found in soil, air, and water.
- It is naturally present in the body and secreted by the kidneys to neutralise excess acid.
- However, it is highly diluted when in the environment and does not affect the human body to a noticeable level.
- Ammonia gas is toxic and affects the lungs with a possibility of causing chemical pneumonitis, inflammation of the lung caused by aspirating or inhaling irritants.

General Circulation Models (GCM)

- GCM represents physical processes in the atmosphere, ocean, cryosphere and land surface.
- It is the most advanced tool currently available for simulating the response of the global climate system to increasing greenhouse gas concentrations.
- GCMs depict the climate using a threedimensional grid over the globe, typically having a horizontal resolution of between 250 and 600 km.
- Many physical processes, such as those related to clouds, also occur at smaller scales and cannot be properly modelled.
- The data is tricky, and predictions can more often than not be inaccurate.
- For example, an IPCC model would predict a temperature increase of a massive range between 1.9oC and 4.5oC, if carbon dioxide in the atmosphere is doubled.

Leprosy Disease

- Leprosy mainly affects the skin, the peripheral nerves, mucosal surfaces of the upper respiratory tract and the eyes.
- Symptoms may occur within a year but can also take as long as 20 years or more to occur.
- Based on the number of skin lesions and other symptoms, leprosy is classified as paucibacillary and multibacillary, the latter being more severe.
- Leprosy is known to occur at all ages and is curable, treatment in the early stages can prevent disability.
- Its mode of transmission has never been fully understood, and its likely transmitted via droplets, from the nose and mouth, during close and frequent contact.

- Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) has recently commissioned a Monpa handmade paper making unit in Tawang, Arunachal Pradesh.
- It not only aims at **reviving the art** but also **engaging the local youths** with this art professionally and earn.

Monpa Handmade Paper

- The art of making Monpa handmade paper originated over 1000 years ago.
- The art is an integral part of local custom and culture in Tawang in Arunachal Pradesh.
- The fine-textured handmade paper is also called as Mon Shugu in the local dialect.
- The paper has great historic and religious significance as it is the paper used for writing Buddhist scriptures and hymns in monasteries.
- The Monpa handmade paper, will be made from the bark of a local tree called Shugu Sheng, which has medicinal values too. Hence

- availability of raw material will not be a problem.
- Back then, such was the scale of production that Monpas used to sell these papers to countries like Tibet, Bhutan, Thailand and Japan as no paper making industry existed in these countries at that time.
- However, the handmade paper industry gradually began declining and the indigenous handmade paper was taken over by inferior Chinese paper.

Handmade Pottery and Handmade Furniture

- Apart from handmade paper, Tawang is known for two other local crafts – handmade pottery and handmade furniture – that are also getting extinct with passage of time.
- KVIC is also planning to revive these two local arts.

Eastern Dedicated Freight Corridor (EDFC)

Western Dedicated Freight Corridor (WDFC)

• DFCCIL is also constructing the WDFC (1504 route km) that connects *Dadri in Uttar Pradesh to Jawaharlal Nehru Port in Mumbai* and will traverse through the states of UP, Haryana, Rajasthan, Gujarat and Maharashtra.

e-Sampada

- It is a significant step towards promotion of egovernance to boost transparency and accountability in providing various Estate Services like allotment, retention, regularisation, no dues certificate etc.

Zero Coupon Bonds

 A zero-coupon bond is a debt security that does not pay interest but instead trades at a deep discount, rendering a profit at maturity, when the bond is redeemed for its full face value.

About the recent bond

 Unlike the previous tranches of recapitalisation bonds which carried interest and were sold to different banks, these bonds have a maturity of 10-15 years and issued specifically to a particular institution. (In this case, Punjab & Sind Bank).

- It is limited only for a specified period and only those banks, whosoever is specified, can invest in them, nobody else.
- It is not tradable and it is not transferable.
- Since these bonds are not tradable, the lender has kept them in the HTM bucket, not requiring it to book any mark-to-market gains or losses from these bonds.

- It is run by the Denmark-based international, nongovernmental, non-profit organization Foundation for Environmental Education (FEE).
- In order to qualify for the Blue Flag, a series of stringent environmental, educational, safety, and accessibility criteria must be met and maintained.

Sea of Galilee

- The lake lies in northern Israel, between the occupied Golan Heights and the Galilee region.

Proxima Centauri

- Proxima Centauri is 4.2 light-years away from the Sun, considered a close distance in cosmic terms.
- Its mass is about an eighth of the Sun's, and it is too dim to be seen with the naked eye from Earth.
- Although it has a very low average luminosity, Proxima Centauri is a flare star that randomly undergoes dramatic increases in brightness because of magnetic activity.
- Astronomers recently picked up an "intriguing" radio wave emission from the direction of Proxima Centauri.

- The giant iceberg A68, the biggest block of free-floating ice from Antarctica with an area of about 5,800 sq. km, has been drifting in the Atlantic Ocean since 2017.
- This year, due to an ocean current, the iceberg was propelled into the South Atlantic Ocean.
- Since then it has been drifting towards the remote sub-Antarctic island of South Georgia, which is a British Overseas Territory (BOT).
- Recently, US National Ice Center (USNIC) confirmed that two new icebergs calved from A68a and were large enough to be named and tracked. They are called A68E and A68F.

Indian SARS-CoV-2 Genomic Consortia (INSACOG)

- INSACOG is a platform for scientists, virologists, experts studying diseases and government officials to interact and track the genomic variations of the novel corona virus.
- The overall aim of the INSACOG is to monitor the genomic variations in the SARS-CoV-2 on a regular basis through a multi-laboratory network.
- This vital research consortium will also assist in developing potential vaccines in the future.
- It comprises 10 labs namely DBT-NIBMG Kalyani, DBT-ILS Bhubaneswar, ICMR-NIV Pune, DBT-NCCS Pune, CSIR-CCMB Hyderabad, DBT-CDFD Hyderabad, DBT-InSTEM/ NCBS Bengaluru, NIMHANS Bengaluru, CSIR-IGIB Delhi, and NCDC Delhi.
- DBT-NIBMG as the Co-ordinating Unit of Genome Sequencing Consortium and will closely work with a Nodal Unit of NCDC.

- The Ethanol Blending Program (EBP) was started in 2003.
- The blending percentage of ethanol in petrol has gone up from 1.53% in 2013-14 to 5% in 2019-20 and estimated to be 8.5% in 2020-21.
- The Government has setup an ambitious target of 10% ethanol blending by 2022 and 20% ethanol blending by 2030.
